CENOTAPH GETS \$100 DONATION

Decision Is Made at Yesterday's Meeting of Nicholas Wilson Chapter.

PLAN ART EXHIBIT

Interesting Address on China and Pottery Given by O. Hayden.

The decision to contribute \$100 to the cenotaph project was an important item of business at yesterday's meeting of the Nicholas Wilson Chapter, I. O. O. F., held at the home of Mrs. A. D. Robertson, St. James street.

The completion of the cenotaph for the war dead is the main object of the chapter, and an interesting address on "Pottery and China" by O. Hayden was also featured at the afternoon meeting.

Mr. Hayden's address was a well-compiled history of pottery and china, dating from the first work done in China in 945 A.D. Mr. Hayden traced the history of this interesting industry to the time of its introduction into England in 1709, to the time of the invention of the first transfer work by Hancock in 1756, and to the time of the introduction of the celebrated Wedgwood ware in 1759.

The lecture was most comprehensive and during the course of it slides were thrown on all the varieties of china of the various eras by the speaker. Several tables of type pieces were used by Mr. Hayden to illustrate his remarks, much to the enjoyment of his audience.

A bevy of gaily-colored balloons, black and white pennants, flowers and gaily-colored booths make Warner hall one of the most attractive spots in the city. However, the decorations are by no means the greatest attraction, for it is the wonderful display of handwork that marks the opening of the annual bazaar today.

It is a calendar affair, and every booth represents a month. Besides the 12 prettily decorated stalls there are also the four seasons and a "filling station."

"Neath a myriad of color are shown the work of the women's hands during the past year. Everything that one could desire in the way of dainty lingerie, charming little luxuries for the home comforts for the boudoir, extras for the kitchen and things for the wee tots are laid out for sale. Rarely has there been such a fine showing of handwork in the city and so much of it.

Ve Gift Shoppe.
December, the month so near at hand, is a booth containing Christmas gifts. In fact, it is the gift shop and on display are many lovely presents. January is the Spanish booth and here, under almond blossoms, are displayed the Oriental wares and baskets, hearth brushes and even riding hats. February is the Valentine booth where all kinds of lovely miscellaneous articles are to be viewed. Household things to wear and use line the walls and the counter.

March, the month of St. Patrick's Day, must be a booth of green and white decorations, for a display of beautifully embroidered Irish linens. April is looked after by the dainty young girls of the church and here nearly 200 dolls, all in the daintiest clothes, rest amid Easter decorations.

Each month representing Victoria Day, with its Union Jacks and huge firecrackers, shelters the fish pond.

Aids for Bride-Elects.
June, the month of brides, aids the bride-elect with her towels. Several hundreds of fine white towels, hand towels, bath towels and tea towels—make up this display. The booth itself is appropriately decorated in orange and white and many orange blossoms. The July booth has Dominion Day as its suggestion for decoration, and here Canadian flags and blue and white decorations make an effective background for the many exquisitely-worked aprons.

Sweets repose in the gayest little baskets or tins, and a variety of purple and yellow decorations are effectively used in decorating. September, a month for housecleaning and replenishing the linen closet, will look after in the September booth. Here there are sheets and pillow cases, and, in fact, everything in the way of household necessities. Across the way from September is October, and amid a myriad of large pumpkin flowers are shown the prettiest handkerchiefs. November, a reminder of crisp fall days and good appetites, brings one to the November booth, decorated in pink and white, where all the good things to eat are for sale. It is the home-cooking table, and it is laden with tasty pastries, cakes, bread and cookies.

Seasons Represented.
Besides the months are the Spring booth, filled with dainty lingerie and house dresses; Summer, a booth containing aprons, quilts and other articles; Autumn, the country store, and Winter, a booth overflowing with very beautiful quilts, all of which have been made by the women of the church.

At the filling station, ice cream, cider and other soft drinks satisfy the thirst. It is gay with blue and white decorations, the Rover club colors.

The Chinese tearoom is a feature of the bazaar. It is very attractive with its peach blossoms, wistaria and tiny bowls of flowers. The waitresses are all wearing full Chinese costumes and are serving Chinese food. During the bazaar, Miss Harris, Mrs. T. J. Murphy, Mrs. Frank Jewell, Mrs. Fred White and Mrs. W. S. Westland will preside over the tearoom. A large basket of "mums" will be given away to the lucky customer. Two special features of the event are the Egyptian lady, who reads the stars and tells fortunes, and a small studio, where Mrs. Seely-Smith will make cut-out silhouettes.
