Ella Payne, the young girl charged with larceny, was let off by the Police Magistrate yesterday, sentence being suspended. The drunks were, William Lead, fined \$5 or 20 days; George Maher, discharged; George Harvey, fined \$3 or 20 days; James Shepherd, fined \$5 or 20 days.

The Toronto Telegram asks:—"Why should Protestants sit still while the schools are being interfered with by the representatives of the Catholic Church? We can all see how quickly the Catholics would spring to their feet if any of their rights were threatened by the Protestants."

Mr. George W. Ross continues to repeat his statement that after the decision of the Privy Council in the Ontario boundary case, the Dominion Government had granted timber limits in the disputed territory. The statement is a falsehood; but Mr. Ross will continue to repeat it at every meeting he attends to the close of the campaign.

Mr. John McClary, of the firm of McClary & Co., of this city, was in Port Stanley the other day regarding the establishment of a branch country there. A public meeting of the ratepayers of the village was held Tuesday to consider the granting of a bonus of \$5,000 in consideration of the foundry employing between 40 and 50 hands.

"An Eye-opener" writes as follows to the Toronto Telegram:—"Much has been said through the press about His Grace Archbishop Lynch and Mr. Fraser having in a great measure the control of the Ontario Government. If such was the case hitherto, what may be expected in future should the Ontario Government be retained in power by the Catholic vote?"

The "Tiger" has turned its attention (and abuse) to Rev. Evans Davis, of London South, for expressing his honest convictions upon the mutilated Bible. Now, it might tell the Christian public of London South what it thinks of its Grit friends at that suburb who held open meetings at McKenry's committee rooms, on the Warden road, during the afternoon and evening of Sunday last.

A Farmers' Institute, attended by professors from the Ontario Agricultural College, will be held in the L. B. Town Hall, at Coldstream, on January 10 and 11 next, and on the evening of the 10th, under the auspices of the Lobo Lecture Club. Papers of practical worth and interest to farmers will be read and discussed, and addresses by prominent men in the county will be given. Four sessions will be held, free to all interested in agriculture.

The Toronto News (the labor organ of that city) says:—"Mr. Hardy's assertion that the Provincial Franchise Act is based upon the platform of the Knights of Labor, if he is correctly reported, is an audacious misstatement. As every one should know, that platform demands manhood suffrage—not a clumsy, complicated scheme, so intricate in its working that it is a matter for a lawyer to decide who has or has not the right of suffrage. Moreover, the same objection applies to this feature of the Government's policy as to the emigration matter."

Mr. George Buskin, missionary of the Algoma and North-west Evangelical and Colportage Mission, directed to the laborers of that district, is in the city, seeking aid to further the work. During the past four years more than 1,000 Scriptures in many languages, and 3,000 Scriptural books have been supplied; large numbers of religious tracts and magazines have been distributed, and many religious services held. Fletcher; "Going to Tea," recitation, Miss H. Neel; "Thompson's and Butterwick's Difficulty," reading, Master S. Searson; "Keep in the Middle Road," chorus song, several voices.

The death of Julia, wife of Isaac Barrows, occurred at Nilestown on Saturday evening. Deceased had endured a long and painful illness with a Christian's spirit of submission. The funeral, which took place on Monday, was largely attended. The sermon was preached by Rev. W. S. Goodell, of Smith's Bay, and forth the beauty and grandeur of Universalism, in which faith deceased rejoiced to live, and which grew brighter day by day until the close of her life. She was 72 years of age, and had been a resident of Nilestown for many years, being held in high esteem by all who knew her. The Methodist Church, in which the services were held, was filled with friends who came to pay the last respects to one whom all will remember with gratitude and praise.—COM.

The Methodist Church, Kerwood, was formally reopened on Sunday last, and attentive congregations being present at both morning and evening services, at which the Rev. Messrs. McDonald and Hayburn officiated. The Sabbath school was also visited by these gentlemen, who delivered interesting addresses to the teachers and classes. On Monday a splendid tea meeting was held in the church, which has been enlarged at an expense of over \$1,000, and under the presidency of the pastor, Rev. W. H. Shaw, a very pleasing program was rendered, and a large number of subscriptions heretofore received, will, it is thought, the entire debt owing on the building.

A perfect boon appears to have been inaugurated in favor of Mr. R. Tooley, the Liberal-Conservative candidate for East Middlesex. Betting rules strongly in his favor, and he is expressed to be confident of his return that wagers are now being made not simply upon his election but on the probable majority which he will receive. One gentleman yesterday offered \$100, even that Mr. Tooley will have a majority of one hundred votes, and another bet of \$50 to \$25 was wagered that the Conservative will receive more than 15 officers and fifty majority. In fact the "Tiger" people admit as much themselves—in a private and confidential way.

The Bradford Telegram says:—"Major Stuart, G. O. M., of the 1st Battalion, 2nd Corps, Toronto, in speaking to our representatives for admission to the School was greatly pleased to see so many of the applicants and relieve the pressure on C. O. M."

THE KENNEDY MURDER.—An esteemed correspondent, writing from Granton, says he has just returned from East Tawas, Mich., the scene of the death of Joseph Kennedy's body. The particulars learned are somewhat different from first reports.

The body was found in a well near a cottage occupied by Tom Murphy. It was discovered by Dr. J. Larabee and J. N. Green, who had been told a day or two previous to the finding of the body by a neighbor named Wilkins that Murphy told him he had buried a calf there. This aroused the suspicions of Larabee and Green; who, going out under the pretense of hunting, went to the spot named by Wilkins and found under the body about three inches of earth, the feet being barely covered. The body was brought to Tawas City and placed in the vacant photograph gallery. An inquest was held in the Court House by Coroner A. G. Van Wey. The Joseph Kennedy referred to is a brother of John Kennedy, of Biddulph. He is supposed to have been murdered by some bad characters in a house of evil reputation, which he was lured to visit on a pretence of a business engagement.

WHAT'S IN A NAME.—Judge Chambers, of Detroit, has been engaged for a number of days in examining the alleged infringement of patent case brought some time ago by the Grand Rapids Hoptonic Co. against Kirby Gregory, who is engaged in making another quality of hoptonic for the Carling Brewing and Malting Co., of London, Ont. The plaintiffs secured a temporary injunction at the time they filed their complaint, but it was dissolved soon after by Judge Jemison, who expressed the opinion at the time that it was no infringement. The Grand Rapids Company complained that Carling & Co. manufacture and sell at a shilling a bottle, while the product of the complainants is sold at a dollar a bottle. This, they claim, is injuring their business, and that Carling & Co. are profiting by the complainants' advertising. Carling & Co. claim that as their tonic is composed more or less of hops they have a right to call it a "hop-tonic." One hearing has been continued until December 30. Judge Chambers says that the question is a puzzling one, as it involves the right of a man to name his article what it is.
