The effectiveness of farm manure as a fertilizer depends on a number of conditions, but there are no fixed standards for its general application. However there are certain known facts acquired by experiments, and among them the points of greatest practical importance are:

- (a) Use of fresh manure. Its advantages:
 - (1) It is more assured supply of fertilizing material.

Now as to the relation which exists between manure and crops, we must take care to distinguish between the manure of all common farm animals but for the best results certain precautions should be observed.

When a sensitive crop is to be grown, it is best to put it in a soil which has received a generous application of manure the year before. Or another method would be to apply the manure to the soil in the autumn and then to sow the sensitive crop the spring following.

For example, cereals are injured by large direct applications of fresh manure. It is therefore better to use it at the expense of the grain. Wheat and barley are particularly sensitive in this respect. It is therefore advisable to put the manure on the soil before the crop as the latter responds better to it.

**It is Reported to be Vastly
Cheaper and More Powerful
Than Gasoline.**

Washington, Dec. 7.—"Lubely fuel" vastly cheaper than gasoline and possessing many advantages over that product, has been invented by officers of the Navy. The new fuel now being produced in large quantities, it became known.

The new fuel is the result of more than a year's work of the Chief of Major O. Zimmerman and Captain M. C. Weinberger, of the research and development divisions of the general engineering staff of the Navy.

The base of the new oil is kerosene, Major Zimmerman said. The other ingredients are of a chemical nature and are readily obtained. The process of manufacture is exceedingly simple.

The tests which proved conclusively that the new fuel was better than gasoline, he said, have shown that it has been most exact and rigid. They were conducted under the supervision of the Bureau of Standards here.

The new fuel, he said, is well suited to use extensively in automobiles, motor boats, and aircraft. It is used in engines and hydro-airplanes, in cold and warm weather, under violent variations of load, with poor and good operators, said Major Zimmerman.

Interesting Letter from a North Shore Soldier—Street Fighting Was Fierce.

Newcastle, Dec. 4.—The capture of the Cambrai by the Canadian army is vividly described by Pte. Theodore Bell, of Derby, Northumberland Co., who writes to his brother, Mr. Percy Bell, of this town. The letter, from the Colchester General Hospital, says:

"Dear Brother—Just a few lines to say that I am in the English again, and glad to get away from the line for another spell. I got shot in the arm and a piece of shrapnel in the ankle. I was in the hospital for a week and am going to get up. There are about seven thousand wounded here, fresh from the trenches, and I expect to be in the hospital for another hospital Tuesday, with several hundred Canadian boys. I am in a large tent, and it is very cold and damp, and the only thing that keeps me warm is the good news from the line, and everything looks good now.

"I don't tell you how you up here and I don't think I will be back before Christmas. I am lucky to be alive after the last big attack. I don't know how many of my friends are, but wait till I arrive home to talk to about it, but no doubt you know a little. We had just come out of the line and were in the line. Amiens. We had heavy fighting there and I came out without a scratch, but our casualties were heavy."

I stopped and gave one fellow a drink out of his canteen. He told me he had been hit. He said he was wounded two days before. I couldn't do anything for him. I went on.

I don't think I had an hour's sleep in the whole time I was in the line. The excitement kept us going. When I got back again I am going to try and join the artillery. As I have heard through the trenches that I can't forget the first morning we crossed the canal. The engineers were right on the job, putting in bridges and pushing back and it was a real picture to see the transports coming on the dead gallop. Then you would see a bridge blown up and the tanks would be there minutes you would see them blow up.
