Galbrath, whose ripe experience and devotion to the cause of artistic development should place its success beyond question, has opened galleries at 108-110 King-street west, where there are now daily on view, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p. m., over 400 works of superior charactor, the great majority being the production of French artists of world-wide reputation. Many of them have been on exhibition at the Paris Salon and who the highest encomiums from the connoisseurs of the Old World. The first consideration with the management is to gecure in everything shown under there auspices a high degree of artistic excellence, and the thousands of appreciative citizens who have so far availed themselves of the privilege of viewing this choice and varied display of art treasures can testify to the fact that, taken as a whole, it far exceeds sany art exhibition heretofore seen in Toronto.


