SUING FOR HOSPITAL FEES.

The German Hospital, of Chicago, is plaintiff in an action that is set down for trial at the January sitting of the High Court in Hamilton. The defendant is Mr. Philip H. Metzger, of Waterloo, Ont., executor of the estate of his late father, Mr. Carl Metzger, who died in Hamilton in June last. The suit is for \$1,000 which the hospital authorities say was withheld them by the deceased while he was under treatment at the hospital in 1899. A new will, made a few days prior to his death, left all the property to his relatives. Failing to establish his claim by this will the plaintiff asks the court to allow \$253 for keep and medical attendance. Messrs. Bruce, Bruce and Counsel, of Hamilton, are acting for the plaintiff.
