Eventually it was taken down, sent back to its founders, Messrs. Keneely and Son, West Troy, N. Y., and in June last it was restored to its accustomed place in the tower where it had hung nine years, with all its former power as a Sabbath going bell, as well as a public index of the flight of time. This reflects great credit on the Churchwardens, who have not only effected its restoration, but have devised the means by which the cost might be met in a short time, the bell being now paid for by their efforts.
