We have kept our horses in good working order on oats in the sheaf cut up and made into mixed feed with commeal, and we have known the same to be done on cut corn fodder and meal. The grain will do as a substitute for the and mean. The grain will do as a substitute for the nourishment of the hay and straw, or corn-fodder will make up the bulk. The important point is to know just where to draw the line.


