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tivation and defence. To find men pos-' sessed of these qualifications, they turned 'their eyes to Germany and the Highlands of Scotland, and resolved to send over a ' number of Scotch and German labourers to 'their infant province. When they publish-'ed their terms at Inverness, 130 High-'landers immediately accepted them, and 'were transported to Georgia; a town on 'the river Alatamaha, which was considered as the boundary between the British and Spanish territories, was allotted for the 'Highlanders; on which dangerous situation they settled, and built a town, which they 'called New Inverness. About the same time, 170 Germans embarked with James ' Oglethorpe, and were fixed in another quarter; so that in the space of three years, Georgia received above 400 British subjects, and about 170 foreigners. **Afterwards** several adventurers, both from Scotland and Germany, followed their countrymen, and 'added further strength to the province \*.'
