

'tivation and defence. To find men pos-  
 'sessed of these qualifications, they turned  
 'their eyes to Germany and the Highlands  
 'of Scotland, and resolved to send over a  
 'number of Scotch and German labourers to  
 'their infant province. When they publish-  
 'ed their terms at Inverness, 130 High-  
 'landers immediately accepted them, and  
 'were transported to Georgia; a town on  
 'the river Alatamaha, which was considered  
 'as the boundary between the British and  
 'Spanish territories, was allotted for the  
 'Highlanders; on which dangerous situation  
 'they settled, and built a town, which they  
 'called New Inverness. About the same  
 'time, 170 Germans embarked with James  
 'Oglethorpe, and were fixed in another quar-  
 'ter; so that in the space of three years,  
 'Georgia received above 400 British subjects,  
 'and about 170 foreigners. Afterwards  
 'several adventurers, both from Scotland and  
 'Germany, followed their countrymen, and  
 'added further strength to the province\*.'
