The vessel ched it with her starboard bow, but fortunately the impact only badly dented a couple of her plates. The Chiltern Range struck the berg a glancing blow. No, we did not reverse the engines, or I would not be here to tell the tale. We just slid off the berg as it were. Had the engines been reversed, there would probably have been a stem-on collision.

Feared Submerged Spur.

"What I was most afraid of was that an underlying spur of the iceberg might rip the ship open as was the case when the Titanic struck. When the ship struck away from the berg, we went to the eastward, but very slowly. We stood away to the eastward till dark, and lay all night with the engines almost stopped. We were surrounded by icebergs, which we could not see, but we could hear. After every plast of the whistle, a sound like the report of a gun followed from 26 to 30 ort of a gun followed from 20 to 30 conds later."
