# DIBBLE IN FINAL OF SINGLES BEAT BUTLER IN QUARTER MILE

Canadian Champion Again Took Measure of Argo Man -Argos Won Fours From Vespers.

BOSTON, Aug. 8.-American and Canadian oarsmen divided honors in the first day of the forty-first annual regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen, held in the Charles River basin Toronto carried off the chief honors for the visitors from across the border, the Halifax scullers falling to win a prize.

Dibble's time was considered faster than that of his American rival, altho the Toronto man did not appear to exert himself, until he entered the last quarter. He is generally considered the favorite for tomorrow's final. The winner of this event will be entitled to compete later in the day in the championship singles, which carries with it the association singles, also won the quarter-mile championship, in which he and his Toronto rival, E. B. Butler, rowed with their shells lapped all the way. Dibble retained a slight advantage at the start, fir ishing 11-5 seconds ahead of Butler. 


