MOST SPECTACULAR PROGRAM IN YEARS

Ward Two Conservatives in a Grand Rally Last Night.

PROMINENT SPEAKERS.

Tax Impositions Necessary and Canadians Willing to Share Burden.

Ward Two Conservatives in a grand rally last evening generated patriotic enthusiasm as an engine generates steam, and the excess burst forth periodically in great roars of applause. In Victoria Hall, draped and decorated, the rank and file of the organization assembled under the gaze of President James Morris, for one of the most spectacular and entertaining programs in years.

A military display featuring the allies and John Bull, backed with stirring patriotic music, tugged the pulses of the audience at the opening of the evening. Addresses from Hon. A. E. Kemp, Hon. T. W. McGarry, G. Howard Ferguson, Dr. R. A. Payne and others rounded the members into clamorous appreciation.

Election Only Hinted.
There was little political significance in the event, the election was hinted but once and the feature of the evening was the wholehearted welcome of the two new Ontario ministers.

Mr. Kemp traced the present war struggle from its inception in 1912, when Bismarck formulated the military text and prepared for world conquest. He stated that already Canada had voted 150 millions to equip her volunteers for the field, and this time the Dominion would pay her way. He stated that the tax impositions were necessary, and he believed all Canadians were willing to bear their share of the burden.

In regard to the tariff against British imports he said that it gave British goods a better market than ever before. On an import of 135 millions Britain was given a 2 1/2 per cent tariff preference—a greater one than ever enjoyed before.

Applause for McGarry.
Hon. Thomas McGarry was greeted with great applause. He too, in patriotic vein, demonstrated the action being taken by the empire. The eyes of the world were on England, realizing that she possessed in her navy the greatest engine of offence and defence which man had ever constructed. The work was not spectacular but effective. He drew a vivid picture of the task performed in the North Sea and on the trade routes, and stirred his audience with his descriptions.

TWO KINGSTON SOLDIERS WOUNDED IN FRANCE
Unofficial Report Says Ptes. Harvey and Warrington Hurt—Sapper Killed.

KINGSTON, March 22.—Sapper Franklin Thomas Bristol, who has been killed at the front, spent the greatest part of his life here. He was born at Seely's Bay. His wife and three children survive. Al-though not in the official list, word has been received that William F. Harvey and Robert Warrington of this city have been wounded.

BOARD'S NOMINEE WAS STRUCK OUT

Colonel Langton's Name Not to Be Dragged in Mire.

THREE HOUR DEBATE
Question of Fire Commissioner Came Before Council Last Night.

The private caucus which it was promised would take place before yesterday's council meeting, resolved itself into an informal discussion of the board of control's recommendation that Col. J. P. Langton be made head of the department. As a result, it did not have the desired effect of shortening the debate in council.

It now appears that Col. Langton is not the applicant for the position of fire commissioner, and, according to Controller O'Neill, he has stated that he does not desire the position unless council is unanimous in its appointment.

Favors Investigation.
Ald. McBride was in favor of the investigation into the whole department going on.

Ald. McBride declared that the very men who wanted an outside man were the ones who voted for John C. Noble. He claimed that there were a dozen, perhaps two dozen, men in the department, that could fill the position. "If you want a fire-fighter you can get him in the department," said the alderman, "but if you want a business man, then you might go outside, but from the information I have of Col. Langton, he is not the man we want."

Was Struck Out.
From the opinions expressed it was quite apparent that the nominee of the board of control for the position of fire commissioner did not meet with the approval of the majority of the members and as a result Colonel Langton would come in for the usual treatment at the hands of council. In order to prevent the colonel's name being a target for those aldermen who were not in favor of the appointment, Controller O'Neill moved that the board's recommendation be struck out and sent back, the motion being carried after a debate which lasted about three hours of council.

HOLLAND ASSURED INTERESTS SAFE
British and French Governments to Respect Netherlands and Colonies.
ONLY ONE EXCEPTION
Hague Administration Fears to Accept Relaxation Provision Owing to Neutrality.

LONDON, March 22.—(12.45 a.m.)—A Reuters dispatch from The Hague says: "According to diplomatic papers communicated to parliament tonight, the British and French ministers at The Hague, in announcing the counter-measures against the German blockade, assured the Dutch government that the interests of the Netherlands and her colonies would be safeguarded to the utmost degree."

"In letters dated March 19, to the British and French ministers, the Dutch minister pointed out that the Dutch government, without criticising the measures of the belligerents, must prevent the relaxation of the provisions of Article VIII of the British order-in-council, it is added in the letter to the British minister, that the Dutch government is unable to give the declaration asked therein, because it considers such declaration contrary to its neutral duties."

Article VIII of the British order-in-council reads: "Nothing in this order shall prevent the relaxation of the provisions of this order in respect of the merchant vessels of any country which declares that no commerce intended for or originating in Germany, or belonging to German subjects shall enjoy the protection of its flag."
