

and has FAILED - AND
certainly very heavily.
Leaving nothing, and no
one or railway authorities have
any counters, it is possible that it
will never be completed.

This being the case, let us see what
has caused this great loss and calamity.
The Province of Nova Scotia,
and the Counties of Yarmouth and
Digby. There can be no doubt that the
calamity has been principally produced
by the violation of law by the Government,
in the payment of the subsidy.
See, 3, cap. 12, of the Acts of 1874,
says:

"And as soon as it shall be satisfactorily
proved to the Governor in Council that
the said company shall have bona
fide expended the sum of fifty thousand
dollars in actual disbursements on the road
hereinafter to be built by them, it shall
be lawful for the Governor in Council, as
to works on the several roads in progress,
pay to such company the sum of twenty
thousand dollars as a portion of such aid
AS SOON IN LIKE MANNER FROM
THE TIME PAYMENT UNTIL
THE WHOLE OF THE ROAD UNDERTAKEN BY SUCH COMPANY SHALL
BE FULLY COMPLETED and in full
operation. * * * when the balance
of such aid * * * shall be paid."

In the Report his Honor ac-
lnowledges the Government have pa-
id wholly before the road was more
than one-half finished. The report of
their own Engineer (before referred to)
only claims that \$1,300,794 worth of
work had been done when the road was
stopped. This shows that the Govern-
ment had actually paid out according to
their own showing, MORE THAN ONE
HALF WHAT HAD BEEN EXPENDED ON
THE ROAD! Instead of paying only one-
third as the law plainly required, they
have, according to their own showing,
paid out more than one-half, and ac-
cording to the sworn evidence before the
committee, nearly the whole amount
expended!

The whole trouble has therefore come
from the wilful and direct violation of law
by the Government, and if the whole
county of Yarmouth is to day suffering
from taxes for a railway which will
never be finished, it can only thank the
Government of Mr. Hill, which its late
misrepresentatives so persistently and
stupidly supported.
