The quantity of butter reaching the British consumer from the colonies and foreign countries in the first half of this year has been considerably less than in the corresponding time of 1904. Denmark still maintains the lead with 895,332 cwts, against 283,559 a year ago, the Danish butter still commanding the highest figure, tho this year the New Zealand butter is a close competitor for high figures.
