LONDON, May 15.—Winston Churchill, the under-secretary, in the house of commons to-day, referring to the Daily Mail's report of the closing session of the imperial conference yesterday, branded statements attributed to Sir Robert Bond, premier of Newfoundland, who was quoted as denouncing the colonial secretary, the Earl of Elgin, for deliberately neglecting the Newfoundland fisheries in the interests of American interests, as an impudent fabrication.

DEER PARK, May 15.—The property owners of Deer Park are meeting the board of control in the city hall tomorrow (Thursday), with a petition asking for annexation to the City of Toronto, which says: The petition of the undersigned, who are all ratepayers in Deer Park, shows as follows: Deer Park is that part of the Township of York, the County of York, described as follows: Commencing at the east side of Forest Hill-road at the northwest angle of the intersection of Upper Canada College grounds recently annexed to the City of Toronto, thence northerly along the east side of Forest Hill-road to the southerly limit of the Town of North Toronto, thence easterly along the said southerly limit of North Toronto to the easterly limit of the City of Toronto, thence southerly along the said easterly limit of the City of Toronto to the southerly limit of Mount Pleasant Cemetery, thence southerly along the southerly limit of the Rosedale Ravine, thence southerly along the centre of the Rosedale Ravine to the northerly limit of the City of Toronto, thence westerly following the northerly limits of the City of Toronto to the easterly limit of that part of the Avenue-road district recently annexed to the City of Toronto; thence northerly along the said easterly limit to the northerly limit recently annexed to the City of Toronto; thence westerly along the said limit to the place of beginning.

Will Investigate.

OTTAWA, May 15.—G. F. O'Halloran left this morning for Toronto to hold an enquiry into the action of Dominion Veterinary Inspector Stark of Brampton, who in March, 1906, quarantined and slaughtered 170 lambs belonging to Edwin A.
