Four Hundred Boers Repeatedly Rushed the British Position Near Nquta on July 28.

Durban, July 30.—Details received here of what at first seemed an ordinary skirmish between a British column and a Boer commando near Nquta, July 28, show that a hard all day fight occurred, in which the British narrowly escaped the loss of a gun at the 57th Field Battery.

Aid for Colonies.

London, July 30.—The supplementary civil service estimate asks for £5,000,000, of which £2,000,000 is required by the Colonial Office, as a grant in aid of the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies.

Contractor Will Be Sent to Bermuda Charged With Theft.

Halifax, July 30.—Edward Hooper, a contractor of the British government at Bermuda, in connection with the naval dockyard, was arrested to-night on his arrival here on the West India Line steamer Oriocoo.

King Saved from Sickness.

Philadelphia, July 30.—The North American and London correspondents at St. Louis Friday's distribution of medals in connection with King Edward's medals in form was soothed. His Majesty, on returning to Marlborough House, promptly un-dressed, and was massaged for some time with whisky, and to this is attributed his absence from the sick list.
