Principal Parkin, on rising to address the assembly, referred to the meeting of Old Boys which had taken place just previously, and spoke of the bond which school life creates, especially life at a school with a history and tradition such as that possessed by U.C.C. Speaking of the events of the year, he referred to the passing away of Dr. Henry Scadding, whose long, active and useful life came to a close last purple.
