nance Shown by Drop in Consols.

London, Oct. 4.-(Sun cable.)-The drop in the price of consols below S7 gives prominence to a paradoxical feagives prominence to a paradoxical fea-ture of British national finance. It must be remembered that consols con-sist of a promise to pay perpetual an-nuity. The government's only method of cancellation is their purchase in open market. The amount of the national debt in the form of consols is £500.000,-000. The market value of this debt has shrunk since the eve of the Trans-vaal war something more than a hund-red million pounds. In other words, if England could Hquidate her debt in consols at the present prices she would save half the cost of the South African War above the cost by the same prosave half the cost of the South African War above the cost by the same pro-cess four years ago. The economy of extravance is one of the paradoxes suggested by the peculiar fluctuations of the financial credit of this empire. It is believed in Capel Court that the Am-erican holdings of consols accumulated during the South African War have nearly all been liquidated in the past few months.
