Pretoria, Transvaal, May 18 .- The alleged revolutionists, who presented the appearance of ordinary loafers, were of the world. arraigned yesterday and charged with high treason. They were remanded for a fortnight. Sworn affidavits allege that 200,000 men have been enrolled for military service, and that it was intended to arm them in Natal, to return them to the Rand, and, at a given signal, to seize and hold the fort of Johannesburg for 24 hours, pending the arrival of British troops. One of the prisoners alleges that he was acting under instructions from the British war department.

general political situation."

PROBABLY TRUMPED UP.

London, May 18 .-- A representative of the press saw a number of prominent South Africans connected with the leading concerns of Johannesburg. They all declared they had not received a word from their agents in Cape Colony, indicating, they added, that the affair was "trumped up by the Boer police," and that in any case the men arrested were irresponsible nobodies, with fictitious military titles affixed by the Boers, with the object of discrediting the British in the eyes of the continental powers.

BRITISH ARTILLERY FOR THE TRANSVAAL.

A cablegram to a New York paper says: Three batteries of field artillery have been ordered to South Africa, and will leave England next Monday. Their destination is the national arsenal in the Transvaal, near the Boer Republic. Although the dispatch of these troops is part of a plan to strengthen the British forces in South Africa, the secret orders under which they move makes their departure significant. Their arrival in Natal will give England six strong batteries at that particular point, which is easy of access to the Transvaal.

Washington, May 18. - Humphrey Taylor, a negro suspected of the Rosenstein murder at Slidell, Md., shot and killed Police Sergt.Fritz Passau, wounded Policeman Gow, and kept a posse of half a dozen officers at bay from the loft of a house for nearly two hours. Dozens of shots were exchanged between the officers and the fugitive, who only surrendered when preparations were made to burn the premises.

Last Saturday morning Louis Rosenstein and his wife, who kept a small store at Slidell, were found insensible and horribly wounded in their storeroom. Rosenstein soon died from his injuries and the woman is believed to to be near death. Suspicion fell upon a negro named Humphrey Taylor, alias road station by representatives of the Brown, who had disappeared. TAYLOR SURRENDERED. Surrounded by officers with drawn revolvers he was hustled out of the house to the patrol wagon, where the crowd surged forward with cries of "Lynch him!" "Burn him!" and made a rush for the prisoner. A rope was secured and the mob made a desperate effort to place it around the wretch's neck. The coolness of the officers, however, saved Taylor, though he was rather badly disfigured by blows from the nearest of the crowd. All the way to the station the mob followed the wagon, shouting for vengeance and lingered about the building when he was safely in a cell.

TOLD CONFLICTING STORIES. When questioned by the police in regard to the Rosenstein murder the prisoner became much confused in his replies, and told half a dozen different stories. Aguinaldo's Agents Seeking Terms of Settlement.

FROM ANOTHER SOURCE. St. Louis, Mo., May 18 .- A special cable to the Globe-Democrat from Manila says: It is reported here that

Aguinaldo has decided to accept terms of peace offered by American Philippine commission and that he has started his representatives from San Isidro for Manila. He is said to have reached this decision at a conference held at San Isidro the day before Lawton attacked and that the fight took place after the decision for peace had been reached. The reports are believed

THIS IS DIFFERENT. London, May 18 .- There is no rumor of the surrender or approaching surrender of Aguinaldo current in this city. The Filipinos here reiterate that the latest cable dispatches from Aguinaldo emphatically repudiate any intention to submit and contain the phrase: "We demand absolute independence or will fight to the death." The Filipino junta ridicule the statement that Aguinaldo is a fugitive, and declare that his retirement to the Carballos mountains is part of his strategic plans, as the mountains are almost inaccessible and are inhabited by

savages who use poisoned arrows, and that it is absolutely impossible for the Americans to follow him there.

DRIVING OUT THE REBS. Washington, May 18 .- The following dispatch has been received at the war department from General Otis: "Manila, May 17.-Adjutant-General, Washington: Situation is as follows: Lawton, with tact and ability, has covered Bulacan province with his column and driven insurgent troops northward into San Isidro, second insurgent capital, which he captured this morning; is now driving enemy northward into mountains.
