

Ramblers Win the East End League Championship McClarys Beat Stars in Sensational Two-One Game

M'CLARYS DOUSE THE SATELLITES AND BAKERS TRIM THE ROCKETS

City League Leaders Fight Out Exciting Two-to-One Game.

In a red-hot, sizzling contest, of the blif-bang variety, which eventually culminated in a young riot, the bunch from the tin works handed it to the West London Satellites Saturday by a score of 2 to 1.

The stands at Tecumseh Park were fairly packed with rival rooters, and everybody had their shouting rags on. Megaphones were numerous, and the sight reminded one of the scene at Tecumseh Park last fall when London scored a touch-down over the celebrated Hamilton Cubs, of Rugby fame, within the first five minutes of play. There hasn't been a more strenuous, yet contested ball game pulled off in this vicinity in many moons, and there was cause indeed for the fuss the crowd stirred up over the efforts of their favorites.

Contrary to expectations, Umpire Charlie Smith did not officiate on the occasion. President Beal, of the City League, announced to the press that Smith had been taken with a slight sunstroke.

After some little delay in proceedings the management routed out Pop Stein and Wanless the Long, and between them they got away with the arbiting in clean fashion.

A Contest for Blood.
At the jump-off the great crowd present realized that the contest was for blood; and so it proved.

Jack Wilson officiated for the Stars, while Walter Gibson held down the slab for the champs. Both worked splendidly, and it was only superior support which enabled the big fellow to triumph over his smaller but gamey opponent on the rubber.

Nothing Doing Until Fourth.

The leaders lifted the willow first, but there was nothing stirring until session four, but one bingle being registered on either side until that point. In that round the champs got to little John for three safe pokes, and a tally.

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KEENES COLINS WINS FUTURITY

Whitneys Bar-None Second in the Great Sheephead Bay Stakes.

New York, Aug. 31. — James R. Keene's undefeated colt, Colin, by Commando-Pastorella, won the twentieth renewal of the rich Futurity on the opening of the fall meeting at Sheephead Bay today, with Harry Payne Whitney's Bar None second and Fred Burlew's Chapultepec third. The time, 1:11 1-5, was fast, though 1 1/2 seconds behind the record made by Ogden in 1896 and equaled in 1900 by Ballyhoo Bay. Last year Electioneer won in 1:13 over a slow track. Pope Joan second and De Mund third. Thus Colin is the 2-year-old champion of the year and his owner is richer by about \$40,000. The weather was cool and clear, and a great cosmopolitan crowd thronged the course of the Coney Island Jockey Club at Sheephead Bay to witness the event. The track was in splendid condition and fast. Toronto, Aug. 31. — The News says: T. C. Flanagan, manager of the Irish Canadian Athletic Club, who has just returned from New York, where he had a look at the New York crack athlete's work, says that the athletic situation in Gotham is as acute as it is in Canada. Just which way the cat will jump is yet unknown. "Something will happen soon," he says.

Mr. Flanagan is full of enthusiasm about Alfred Shrubbs, the running Englishman—the world's pro-champion—who meets J. Killaly, of Boston, here at the Island oval next Saturday.

"He isn't as big as a minute," remarked Mr. Flanagan this morning. "He stands about 5 feet 2 inches and weighs about 118 or 120 pounds. He is sea-

thin in the face and his legs are pipe-stems. You would think they would crack clean off if he ran real hard, but he is as springy as a bit of whalbone. He hasn't any stride to speak of, and runs with his arms held out in front like a sprinter. He works his way along and has a fighting method that is far removed from Tom Longboat's long, easy lope as I am from a hummingbird.

"He is a funny runner in more ways than one. He won't stand for any massaging like our athletes over here, and does not want his muscles kneaded. He is simply rubbed down briskly with flesh mitts. He says kneading takes away his strength. On the track he does not run steadily, but in a series of sprints."

THE RAMBLERS TAKE TWO GAMES AND THE EAST END CHAMPIONSHIP

Oriens Defeat the Somervilles by Score of Fifteen to Four.

The Ramblers on Saturday took two games, one from the Wortmans, 6 to 2, and one from the Stars, 5 to 2, thereby winning the championship for 1907 and 1908. In the first game with the Wortmans the Ramblers played a perfect game in the field, not a single misplay of any kind, not even a pass by Pitcher Smith. This is a remarkable record when you consider that there were seventeen assists in the game. Smith, who pitched both games, played his position finely, having eleven assists in the two games.
