LARDER LAKE BOOM NOW ON

New Liskeard, June 11.—Now that the snow has almost entirely disappeared New Liskeard is the busiest place in this northern camp. The stampede to Larder Lake has now almost attained fever heat and the supply merchants experience great difficulty in getting their supplies through and keeping up their stock of miners' supplies on account of the heavy demand for camping outfits.

Hundreds and hundreds of prospectors, miners and capitalists are passing through here on their way to and from Larder Lake. Arrivals from Larder Lake are arousing great enthusiasm on account of the magnificent specimens of quartz, showing plenty of free gold, which they display, the best of which were obtained from the Lucky Boys properties. Intense interest is taken in these properties, and it is reported that mining claims adjoining same are fetching fabulous prices. Their development is being anxiously watched, owing to the number of rich veins which have been uncovered. Additional interest is taken in Lucky Boys owing to the fact that the parties interested are all prominent residents of New Liskeard who are also connected with the most successful mining interests in this country. These properties are regarded as the richest in Larder Lake, as they were the second claims staked in the district.

THINKS CANADA WAS SACRIFICED

In the Alaska Boundary Case—Mr. R. W. Perks' View of the Result.

Toronto, June 12.—Mr. R. W. Perks, M.P. of London, Eng., the millionaire builder of great public works and railways, and the most prominent Methodist layman in England, arrived in Toronto last night, and is staying at the King Edward Hotel.

At 1 o'clock this afternoon Mr. Perks was the guest at luncheon of the Methodist Social Union of Toronto, at the King Edward Hotel. "One of my chief reasons for my visit to Canada just now," said Mr. Perks, "is to look over the ground and see just what is being done about the proposed canal from the Georgian Bay to Ottawa and Montreal. The Canadian Government has not given any final decision on this important work, but in the meantime my firm have the contract for the work if it is gone on with by the parties who got the charter. The cost is put at about \$100,000, and if the canal were constructed it would enable ocean-going vessels to pass and from the great lakes and the ocean and give Canada a self-contained route independent of the present St. Lawrence route."

The canal would, if projected, use the windings of the French River, and connect with the lower waters of the Ottawa. The work of construction might take ten years.

Mr. Perks touched on British politics, too. He confessed that while not an admirer of the House of Lords, he was pleased with the defeat of the education bill by the Lords. The bill was simply a compromise, and satisfied no one, while discriminating most against non-conformists.

The Liberals in Britain were just as strong for free trade as ever, he said. The British people would not tolerate a tax on their food. Joseph Chamberlain's policy was a dead issue, and could not be revived.

THE SAME AS GERMANY

Britain To Have Equal Trade Privileges With U. S.

London, June 11.—Foreign Secretary Grey informed the House of Commons today that the United States had officially assured his majesty's Government that he did not wish to make the administrative provisions of the German commercial agreement the basis for discrimination against any other state, and was willing to apply them to Great Britain if she so desired.

The secretary added that he was communicating with the board of trade with the view of making the necessary arrangements.

Sir Edward Grey later announced that negotiations with the United States, the nature of which he was unable to disclose, were proceeding under section 3 of the Dingley act.

Replying to questions on the subject the secretary said he hoped to secure for Great Britain the same advantages as Germany had derived.

FREE OUTING ON CARS

Montreal Street Railway Will Give Them to the Poor and Infirm.

Montreal, June 11.—The Montreal Street Railway Company announce their intention of again giving free special cars to the children of the city, during the hot months of July and August. Free special cars will be at the disposal of the children as well as of the old and infirm of the public institutions in this city. The outings will consist of a ride around the city and mountains, lasting about three hours. The company request that all schools, churches, missions, orphanages, charitable institutions and old folks' homes desirous to take advantage of the offer would communicate with them as early as possible. The kindness and liberality of the street railway company were evidently appreciated, as last year's records show that nearly 50,000 took advantage and benefited by these free outings, and the company hopes that this year the record will be surpassed.

EXECUTED AS A SPY.

St. Petersburg, June 11.—The body of a youth found today in a wood in the suburbs of St. Petersburg, with his throat cut and his face unrecognizably mutilated, has been identified as an open-air bomb factory with a large quantity of explosives near by. It is supposed that the young man was executed by fellow-terrorists as a spy.

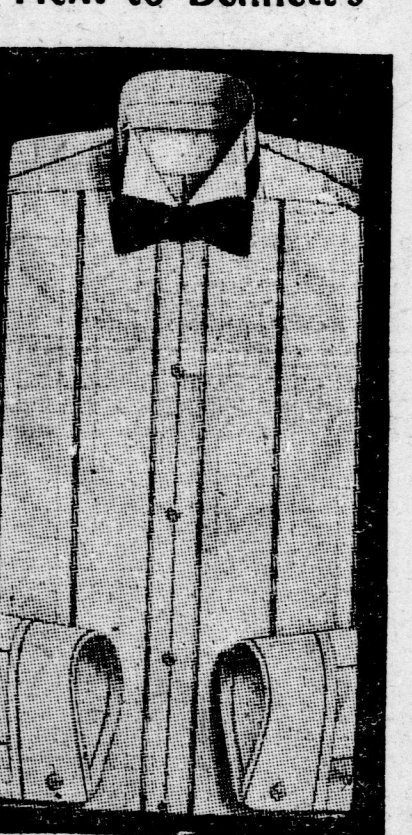
