The doctor entered into an able exposition of the advantages to Canada of the contract, incidentally casting ridicule on the criticisms of the opposition. His only regret was that more money could not be saved to the Canadian people than even the amount saved by the contract. He suggested that a poll tax of \$25 should be imposed on each person going into the Yukon, so that those who went there to pursue other occupations than mining would contribute to the

revenue from the gold lands. Shortly after midnight Mr. Moore, of Stanstead, moved the adjournment of the house.
