"I am commanded to convey to you and to your devoted associates, the thanks and congratulations of our severeign who is happy to pay hom-

thanks and congratulations of our sovereign, who is happy to pay homage once again to the inestimable services of the national committee for reiief in Belgium."

The relief ships, loaded with thousands of tons of food for the seven million people in Belgium, which have been held up in American and other neutral ports are now being hurried to their destination. Unless there is further breach of all undertakings on the part of the Germans, the complete starvation with which Belgium was threatened will breach of all undertakings on the part of the Germans, the complete starvation with which Beigium was threatened will be averted, although great hardship will be inflicted if those vessels now in United Kingdom ports are prevented from completing their voyage of mercy. The American members of the commission for relief are still in Beigium, and the feeding of the Beigian people is being continued on precisely the same lines as heretofore. 
