1,056,550 ARMENIANS
MASSACRED BY TURKS
IN THE YEAR 1916

SALONIKI, Wednesday, Dec. 4.—M.
Khanzadian, an Armenian trader and
a former officer of high rank in the
Turkish army, on his arrival here to-
day declared the German and Turkish
statutes which he saw in Constantinople

Wilson, to be secretary of the treas-
ury, to succeed McAdoo. Mr. Glass will
go into office December 15 under agree-
ment with Mr. McAdoo, whose resigna-
tion was accepted by the president to
take effect upon the appointment and
qualification of his successor.

SAYS GERMANS AS A NATION ARE INHUMAN

Chairman of British Sailors'
Union Speaks.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—Peter Wright,
chairman of the Sailors' and Firemen's
Union of Great Britain, delivered a
stirring address before the Empire
Club here today, and he was repeated-
ly cheered by a large gathering of
citizens.

"I have dined with the kaiser," he
said, "and I tell you I never came in
contact with a beast that had such a
dirty, deceitful face. He had iniquity
written all over his dirty face. I have
seen the text-book of the German
schools, and every little child has been
brought up with the idea to conquer
Great Britain and to beat her to dust.
Says Laurier is wrong."

"I have been reading the words of an
eminent statesman. I refer to Sir Wil-
frid Laurier. He said that the Ger-
man people were all right; it was only
the military classes which were re-
sponsible for this war. I refute that
statement. I am ready to prove to you
that any man who utters that senti-
ment either utters a deliberate false-
hood or is in ignorance."

Wright told of going to Berlin to
wrestle for the international champion-
ship of the world, and out of the 20,000
persons there, there was not one cheer
because he was a Britisher. After
wrestling for nine and a half hours he
was a favorite, and the Hun had tried to
win by a foul. He was, however, paid
in his own coin.

They Know Only Force.
"The only logic which appeals to
their psychology is force and nothing
but force," said the speaker. "We are
not going to rest until we have got this
dirty Kaiser. Bill and until the whole
dirty kin appear before the bar of an
international tribunal to be tried for
the guilty murders they have commit-
ted."

Mr. Wright told of going to France at
the request of Lloyd George to per-
sonally investigate the atrocities there.
He had come to Rheims with General
Foch and later had visited a village immedi-
ately after the Germans had been driven
out.

Women Disemboweled.
"I saw twelve French women lying in
the trenches, disemboweled after they
had been raped by the Huns," he de-
clared. "I saw twelve to thirty boys
with their right wrists amputated. This
was not done by brutal soldiers, but
was the work of skilled physicians."
Since the war he had met one of the
German labor leaders at Stockholm. It
was Herr Scheideemann. He had said:
"Look here, Peter, I want you to under-
stand the whole German nation is in
support of the German army until a
German peace is dictated."

Wright told of deliberately making
the acquaintance of a German spy
while in Stockholm, and sleeping in the
next room to him. In the morning coffee
had been brought in and he had shared
his with the German while the latter
was asleep. An hour later the Ger-
man was a corpse.

the largest poultry show ever seen in
Guelph.

Judges Start Work.
The judges are expected to start on
their work the first thing tomorrow
morning, and to finish up some time on
Saturday. Secretary R. W. Wade ar-
rived in the city from Chicago this
morning, where he attended the big
international live stock exhibition, and
year's show were, simply said: "We are

in every department of the show than

number of bacon-hog entries this year.
The first horses to arrive at the
show were three fine big Percherons,
the property of Lambert Wigle and
Roy Allen of Kingsville. The most of
the horses will arrive tomorrow. There
are 60 more of them this year than
last, an increase in all the classes.
The seed exhibit which is the larg-
est for several years, is rapidly getting
into shape, and will be ready for the
public by Saturday morning.
