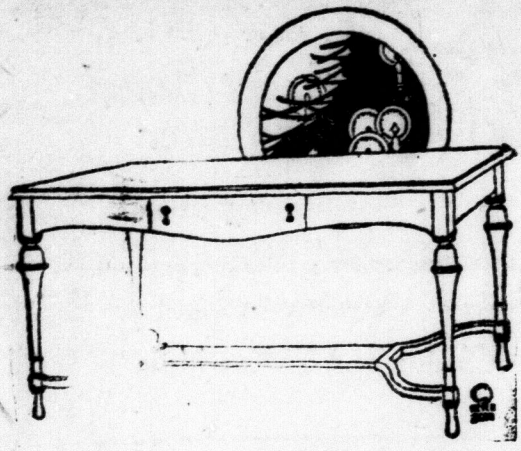

GABY'S FIGURES OUT OF REASON, SAYS GUTELIUS

Former Intercolonial Manager
Says No One Would Build
At Present.

TORONTO, Dec. 10.—Claiming that the estimates of F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, in connection with the hydro commission's projected radial railways, were "utterly beyond all reason," and "absolutely extravagant," F. P. Gutelius, formerly general manager of the Intercolonial Railway, and at present manager of the Delaware and Hudson Railway, gave an opinion today decidedly adverse to the hydro projects before the royal commission which is investigating the radial railway scheme.

Mr. Gutelius claimed that Mr. Gaby's estimates of anticipated revenue anticipated increase of population along the radial railway lines were too high. "It is all very well to make such estimates," Mr. Gutelius said, "but to propose to invest millions of dollars on that basis is not good business. It isn't sound."

Mr. Gutelius claimed that there would be duplication on many parts of the projected radial lines, and this would be a great handicap in securing a necessary operating revenue.

The Canadian Government Rail-

ways," Mr. Gutelius said, "will have a deficit of \$33,000,000, and yet it is intended to build radials to take revenue from another publicly-owned line." No one would build a railway at the present prices, Mr. Gutelius declared. "A railway built today would not pay its fixed charges."

Bakers May Sue City For Damages

Question Right of Council To
Seize Bread Under
Weight.

WINDSOR, Dec. 10.—Windsor may face four suits for damages from four bakers companies brought into police court today, charged with short-weighting bread. The charges were made by Frank Begley, inspector, following an investigation in which bread from all the bakers companies and their wagons were weighed.

Gerald McHugh, acting crown attorney, told the court the council was exceeding its authority in ordering the search and seizure of all bread underweight, since an amendment to the criminal code in Toronto had taken such right from city councils.

SUSPEND PREFERENCE IN FREIGHT RATES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Operation of the provision in the United States merchant marine act allowing preferential rail rates on goods destined for export in United States ships, was indefinitely suspended today by the shipping board.

It was announced, however, that as soon as adequate shipping facilities became available at certain ports prompt enforcement of the provisions would be made.

TAKING ACTION ON DAMAGE CLAIMS

Oxford County Council Also
Turns Down Navy League
Grant.

WOODSTOCK, Dec. 10.—Oxford County council concluded its deliberations this afternoon. The finance committee's report was lengthy and occasioned considerable discussion. The reports recommended that no action be taken in connection with several claims for damages. Bad condition of county roads was the reason put forth in two of the claims for damages to automobiles. One claimant claimed \$1,500, and the Borden Milk Company of Norwich asked for the value of a load of milk lost when one of their trucks upset on the road. The third claim was from a county employee, George Hoyland, who was injured in a gravel pit.

The finance committee was not in a generous mood, as it was refused a grant of \$500 to the Navy League, claiming that the mothers' allowance act would make provision for the widows and children, and the council backed the committee up in all its recommendations.

BORDER RESIDENTS RESENT ACTIVITY OF WOMAN INSPECTOR

Thousands of Dollars Worth
of Merchandise Has Been
Seized.

WINDSOR, Dec. 10.—With public resentment against downtown Windsor merchants at fever heat because of rumors that the Retail Merchants' Association was responsible for the bringing to Windsor of Mrs. Martin, a special woman customs officer, who has conducted a rigid search of all women crossing the border, publicity was given today to a letter received locally from the National Shoe Dealers' Association, which practically assumes the responsibility for interesting the Government in sending the special officer here.

Liquor Spotters Scored in Court

BRANTFORD, Dec. 10.—Grant Merrill, a local hay merchant, was sentenced to six months at Burwash by Magistrate Livingston today, when found guilty of selling liquor. It was a second offence, Merrill having been convicted at Waterloo. The basis of the conviction was that Merrill had secured several consignments of wine under fictitious names, and he failed to account for the disappearance of the liquor.

CANNOT DEAL DIRECTLY WITH DRURY, CLAIM

British Agriculture Minister
Refers To Embargo On
Cattle.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—(Canadian Associated Press).—Lord Lee, minister of agriculture, whose attention was drawn to a statement by Premier Drury that he would go to England himself if necessary and endeavor to secure the removal of the British embargo on Canadian cattle, said that Canadian farmers were determined to get justice in this matter, told the Canadian Associated Press that the question of removing the embargo on Canadian cattle had been pressed upon the ministry of agriculture and the British Government for several years past by the Dominion Government, and frequently by personal representations on their behalf by the Canadian high commissioner, Sir George Perley.

Lord Lee said that he did not propose to discuss the question of the embargo on its merits, but he pointed out that to remove it would only be effected by fresh legislation, which would require the assent of both Houses of Parliament. In the meantime, any further representations regarding the matter, which might be addressed to him by the Dominion Government through its high commissioner, would, of course, receive most careful consideration, Lord Lee added.

Just what the council will do regarding the mayoralty is undecided. If Mayor Winter runs again Labor will back him; otherwise it will wait to see the line-up of candidates.

The labor council approved for the city council Archie Hooper, A. Strong,

and George Wood, present aldermen, and A. E. Clancey and A. F. Harding, two new candidates; for the board of education, H. Brumpton, who has served for two years, and Frank Begley, a new candidate; for hydro commissioner, G. S. Whelton.

DECLARE DEATH ACCIDENTAL.

WINDSOR, Dec. 10.—Accidental death was the verdict returned by Coroner LaBelle's jury here tonight in the death of Miss Jessie Fackler of Detroit, who was fatally injured here Sunday morning when an automobile in which she was a passenger collided with a street car at the corner of Sandwich street and Gladstone avenue. The jury recommended that Sandwich street be widened at this point and that the street railway tracks be placed in the centre of the street.

COTTON PLANT HAS REDUCED WORK HOURS

FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 10.—The Canadian Cottons, Limited, branch mill at Marysville, on Monday will commence working on reduced schedule of hours, the present reduction being from six to four days a week. The present working schedule calls for a nine-hour day and makes fifty hours for a week, there being a half-holiday on Saturday. Five hundred employees are affected.
