Pastor Russett's Sermon

Text: "Godliness With Contentment is Great Gain" (I. Timothy vi, 6)—Pastor Russell Says That Time is Not Yet Ready for a Self-Controlled World—Earth is a Rebellious Province in Universe.

Pastor Russell of Brooklyn Tabernacle preached Sunday from the text: "Godliness, with contentment, is great gain" (I. Timothy, vi, 6). He said: "The only proper contentment is that which combines with godliness and which sees from the standpoint of God's word the Divine power able to correct the difficulties which assail us and all mankind."

That strong government, that loyalty to which every knee must bow and every tongue confess the glory of God, is the kingdom that the world needs. Its rule of righteousness alone will bring to mankind the joy and peace and blessing which all crave, but which none of us are wise enough to know how to bring about.

While our Lord went about doing good, and healed all that were sick, and healed all that were lame, and comforted all the mourning ones, His favors were especially, as in the case of the blind men, given to the poor.

We likewise may do good unto all men as we have opportunity, especially to the household of faith. COOK TO QUIT LECTURING TO REASCEND MOUNT KINLEY

Will Himself Lead a Party to Re-gain Records Which Prove He Reached the Summit.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Having failed in his efforts to get Professor Hensel C. Parker and Anthony Flais to conduct an expedition to ascend Mount Kinley, Dr. Frederick A. Cook announces that he will abandon his lecture tour as soon as possible and himself head an expedition to ascend the mountain, if possible, this winter.

Dr. Cook said: "I am fully determined to break off my lecture tour, complete my Arctic data for Copenhagen, and then head an expedition immediately to Mount Kinley to recover the records which I left there. My decision has been reached owing to the suddenness of the controversy in the last few days. Although I am booked to lecture to the coast and back, I shall not go further than Minneapolis."

As to my north pole data, their completion will require six weeks or two months, but I intend to work on them day and night in order to finish them as quickly as possible. I shall not send them piecemeal, but will have always been my intention to show them in their entirety."

SAT DOWN IN CURRENT TO SWEEP OVER FALLS

Deliberate Suicide of Milwaukee Man at Niagara—Body Recovered by Navy Guides.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., Oct. 17.—Within a half hour after he had gone over the American cataract Saturday afternoon, two guides at the Cave of the Winds, Wm. Barnett and George Wright, recovered the body of George Maero of Milwaukee, Wis., who had set down in the current of the falls.

Never before in the history of the river under normal conditions has a body been recovered from the rapids part of rocks that front the cataract. Maero was seen to enter the water from the north shore of Luna Island by Joe Lennox, a blackman, young Irish couple, large of his, and Officer Alexander of the reservation force. The man first dived himself of his coat, light coat, vest and hat, and then jumped into the stream. A man of 200 pounds in weight, Maero did not lose his footing in the current. The water at that point is very shallow. So he set down in the current, and then bumping along on the rocky bottom for forty feet, he plunged over the crest into the abyss.

Alexander was on Goat Island, too far away to stop Maero. The bridal couple, horror stricken, watched the man until they saw him borne along in the current and then turned away. Alexander ran to the Cave of the Winds House, and informed Barrett and Wright of the suicide. The guides, donning their oilskins and boots, went down the stairs and along the path, watching the boiling water at the base of the falls.

In less than five minutes Maero's body appeared bobbing on the churning water. By an odd turn of fate it was washed up on a flat rock and held there. Wright and Barrett, with ropes around their waists, clambered down on the rocks and, securing the body with difficulty, brought it to the surface. The body was found a letter to the coroner. There was also a copy of a court paper recording the divorce of Maero's wife, Mrs. Maero, in 1907.

On one of the suicide's fingers was a two carat diamond ring, and from a chain about his neck hung a locket containing the portrait of a pretty young woman. The body was badly battered in its trip over the cataract.

The identity of the man who went over the falls on Friday has been established. Thru a letter addressed to Mrs. Maero, it was learned that the man's wife, Mrs. Maero, is the widow of the late Thomas Doherty, a prominent business man of Milwaukee, Wis.

PRINCE GENERAL PROULX PASSES AWAY IN ROME

Prominent Quebec Churchman Was Taken Suddenly Ill While Preparing to Celebrate Jubilee.

ROME, Oct. 17.—(C. A. P.)—Mr. Proulx of Nicolet, Que., who arrived here last week to celebrate his sacerdotal jubilee at St. Peter's, and was stopping at the Canadian College, was taken suddenly ill with intestinal trouble. He was conveyed to the hospital of the English Blue Nuns, where he died after the Pope had sent him his benediction.

Spent Life in Nicolet. Mr. Proulx was born in Nicolet, Que., in 1829, and was ordained a priest in 1859. He was for many years professor at Nicolet College, and was appointed superior in 1892. He never left the diocese in which he was born. He visited the Holy Land in 1872, and his travels are still talked about in journalistic circles. Not many years ago, a correspondent of a Toronto paper was at Nicolet reporting on the death of several ministers of the crown. Two columns had to be wired, but the young lady at the office was inexperienced and could not see the matter. Mr. Proulx came over from the college, and being an expert operator, sat down at the key and flashed the "copy."

AWARDED BIG DAMAGES. William Fitchet Given \$1500 for Wrongful and Malicious Arrest.

William Fitchet was awarded \$1500 damages and costs against J. M. Walton of Aurora, for wrongful and malicious arrest by the jury in the assize court Saturday morning. Fitchet claimed he was kept in prison for 17 days because of a declaration made by Walton that he (Fitchet) was going to leave the province to defraud his creditors. At the time Fitchet is said to have been in Walton's keeping, he realized from the sale of the plaintiff's goods in stock.

HEBREWS IN REVOLT AGAINST WARD BOSSES

Will Use Their Own Judgment in Marking Ballots in Future.

No longer will the practical politician who automatically dispenses campaign cigars be a controlling force among the Yiddish population of old St. John's ward, that is if the organization founded at a meeting in University avenue synagogue yesterday afternoon succeeds in its object.

The body will be known as the Toronto Hebrew Repealers Association, and its announced object is to encourage citizenship and to educate the members to an idea of their civic duties and privileges. The minimum age limit is 15 years.

A. P. Lewis was chairman of the meeting, which was attended by about two hundred Hebrews. The speakers, which were numerous, were delivered in a mixture of Yiddish and English, and were very much in earnest.

Mr. Lewis remarked that the Jews of Toronto had to bear their share of civic responsibility, they should expect to receive their share of the freedom and privileges of British subjects, and should be prepared to work for the common good of the whole community of Jews and Gentiles.

Ware the Politician. Louis Singer advised his hearers to beware of slippery politicians who tried to swing the Jewish voters for their own ends. The condition of the ward should be such that the Jews should be able to get special benefits for Hebrews should be defeated because he was manifestly only a manipulator, and before long would do something for the Jew to the injury of the Jew. They should only support those men who they were convinced were entirely sincere.

Mr. Singer said he had reared a family of eight children in Montreal. Boy Thought Small Twenty-Two Calibre Rifle Was Unloaded and Pulled the Trigger.

NORTH BAY, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—A terrible tragedy occurred to-day at the home of Charles Tupper, a farmer residing about one mile from North Bay, in which Mrs. Tupper was killed by the hand of her little son.

In the house at the time Mrs. Tupper, a woman of 45, and her son, 10 years of age, while the mother was preparing dinner shortly before noon, the boy picked up a small rifle, thinking it unloaded, pointed it at his mother and pressed the trigger. No fire disintegrated the attention of the mother, who found Mrs. Tupper dead on the floor. Coroner McMurphy opened an inquest this evening and after viewing the body an adjournment was made until Friday.
