

tario's estate admit they had a deficit of \$802,000 for the last fiscal year; that the expenditures are growing higher and higher, and that it has been found necessary to tap new sources for revenue to meet the growing costs. But notwithstanding all this, the province is financially in good shape and no apprehension need be felt for the future, they report. Hon. Peter Smith, the provincial treasurer, who delivered his hudget speech, his second since taking office, in the legislature yesterday explained that the deficit was due to abnormal conditions that prevailed last year and to expenditures over which the gov-ernment had no control. during the present fiscal year. The cost of carfying on the various departments of governments for the fiscal year is placed by the provincial treasurer at \$22,122,052. If the province's affairs proved according to schedule, there will be a surplus this year of \$3,561,826.

Billiard halls, bank reserves and real estate transfers will be taxed. The total assets of Ontario are now estimated at \$645,983,000, and liabilities, \$159,752,055.
