**THE BEATIFICATION
OF MOTHER BARAT**

Special services in honor of the
beatification of Mother Barat, the
foundress of the Order of the Sacred
Heart, were held yesterday at the
Sacred Heart Chapel.

The beatification took place at Rome
yesterday of Mother Barat as Blessed
Madeline Louise Sophie.

At the chapel benediction of the
blessed sacrament was said, and the
picture of Mother Barat unveiled.
The special services will be con-
tinued today. Pontifical high mass
will be celebrated by Archbishop Mc-
Eay, assisted by a large number of
priests.

Mother Barat was born of humble
parents at Joigny, Burgundy, Dec. 12,
1778.

Her sole aim was to improve and
educate young girls in art and science.

Since the founding of the order con-
vents have sprung up all over the
world.

The good work of the local convent
and school is recognized in the diocese.

The work laid down by the foundress
is carried out to the letter, both re-
garding religious and general training.

The beatification of Mother Barat
has been under consideration at Rome
for many years, practically since her
death on Ascension Day, 43 years ago
today.

**HAPPENINGS OF A DAY
IN BUSY EAST LONDON.****FR. TOBIN'S EULOGY
OF BISHOP M'EVAY**

Congregation of St. Mary's Church
Was Deeply Affected.

Father Tobin delivered an excellent
sermon in the morning at St. Mary's
Church, Sunday, and made special re-
ference to the elevation of Bishop Mc-
Evay. He paid a splendid tribute to
his lordship, and regretted exceedingly
that he must leave the diocese, al-
though he rejoiced at the honor done
him.

"I am sure you are all grieved," said
Father Tobin, "as all of the priests of
the diocese are grieved, that we have
lost our good bishop. But we rejoice
that he has been recognized by the
hierarchy, upon the diocese and upon this
fair city, by his elevation to the Ach-
iepiscopal See of Toronto. His deep
learning, his apostolic zeal and his
great executive and administrative
ability have been recognized by the
successor of St. Peter and Holy Father
Pius X. In recognition of his eminent
worth, the pallium of an archbishop
will soon rest upon his shoulders and
in the opinion of his priests in this
diocese, of the citizens of London, in-
dependent of race or creed, and of the
people of Western Ontario in general,
the sacred insignia of an archbishop
have fallen on a worthy successor to
Archbishop O'Connor.

"We rejoice with him on the prefer-
ment conferred upon him by the vis-
ible head of the church. We congrat-
ulate him most heartily on the new
honor and dignity and title that have
come to him, and all the more be-
cause we know that they were never
so ardently coveted. If he had his
own way in the matter, he would, I
am sure, have preferred to remain
with his loyal priests and faithful
children of London. But as an obedi-
ent son of the Holy Mother Church,
he must go to her will. Rome has
spoken, and like him we say, 'God's
will be done.'

"The sacrifice we are called upon to
make is, indeed, a great one. Arch-
bishop McEvay has been the bishop
and shepherd of our souls for the
past nine years. During that time he
has endeared himself to both priests
and people by his kindness, his affa-
bility, his generous hospitality, his
zeal for the glory of God, the salva-
tion of souls, and his wise and pru-
dent direction of the affairs of the
church within the confines of the di-
ocese. The years of his episcopate have
been glorious years for Catholicity in
these parts. Churches and parochial
residences have sprung up, as if by
magic at his command in many parts
of the diocese. More than forty sepa-
rate schools have been established
during his regime, for one of the ob-
jects dear to his paternal heart was
the Christian training of the young.
Hospitals for the sick and suffer-
ing, homes for the aged and poor, have
been either erected or enlarged under
his wise administration, until today
I hesitate not to say that there is not
a diocese in Canada where the spiri-
tual, the beneficent and financial af-
fairs of the church are in such good
condition."

Father Tobin also referred to the
former occupants of the archbishop's
chair—Bishops Lynch, Walsh and
O'Connor, all of whom had been most
zealous for the church. Father Tobin
regretted that Bishop McEvay must
go, but rejoiced greatly at his eleva-
tion.

There was a very large congregation
in attendance and the members were
most affected during the service.
