

**SLOW DAY IN CITY MARKET
VERY FEW CHOICE CATTLE**

Receipts Totaled 75 Car Loads With
Quality Common to
Medium.

Receipts of live stock at the city market were 75 loads, composed of 1300 cattle, 80 hogs, 1575 sheep and lambs, with 57 calves and 15 horses.

The quality of the bulk of the fat cattle offered was generally common to medium, with only a very few choice animals offered.

Trade was slow and dull, with prices generally lower than a few days ago.

Trade in export cattle at this market was brisk. Some of the best quality was dead. None were offered and none were bought. A few head of yearling steers and spring cows at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt. and this was the best quotation for the market.

Butchers. Trade in butchers' cattle was slow, with prices easier. There are two markets here, the one being for the city and the other for export as well as for a number of points forward as well as too many worn-out cows. There was probably a fair demand for the city market. The best that sold for a high price than \$1.25 per cwt. We heard of one dealer, after a number of days, had a few head of yearling steers and spring cows, a few choice quality, weighing 1050 to 1150 lbs. and some of them with good horns.

Choice picked lots of butchers' sold at \$4.30 to \$4.40 per cwt.; picked lots of yearling steers and spring cows at \$4.40 to \$4.50; lots of good at \$3.75 to \$4; medium lots at \$3.50 to \$3.65; and some at \$2 to \$2.75.

Feeders. Prices for feeders were easier, though buyers were scarce. Good 1,000 lbs. each, at \$3.70 to \$3.80 per cwt. Distillery by-products, 10 to 12% per cwt., with a slight decline at the latter price.

Stockers. Deliveries were small, especially the common western quality. Prices ran down from \$2 to \$2.75 per cwt., with bulk going at \$2.50 to \$2.60 per cwt.

Milch Cows. Only a limited number was offered, though the market was poor to medium quality, selling at \$30 to \$45 each.

Calves. Prices for veal calves were steady at \$3.50 to \$5.25 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs. Receipts of sheep and lambs were scarce. Lambs sold at \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt.; sheep at \$2.75 to \$3.50 per cwt. and yearlings at \$2.75 to \$3 for bucks.

Hogs. Receipts were small. Prices are easier at \$5.25 for select and \$5 for ill and fat.
