RESUME OF THE WORK OF THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT

Of Twelve Important Measures Forecasted at Opening Only Two Had Been Passed When Parliament Adjourned for Vacation on Saturday.

London, Aug. 3.—Of twelve important measures foreshadowed in the Kings Speech at the opening of parliament in January, just two had been passed up to the adjournment Saturday for the summer vacation. These were the Irisk Universities Bill and the old age pension bill, neither of which was opposed in principle by the opposition although the House of Lords amended some clauses of the pensions bill, only however to have them rejected by the house of commons and to accept the rejections when the bill was returned to the lords in its original form. The old age pensions bill becomes operative Jan. 1, 1909, so that only three months will be chargeable to the present financial year and no great increase in the budget will be necessitated. For the first full year, however, the ministers estimate that six million pounds sterling about \$30,000,000 will have to be found.
