The Jews.—At the meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, last week, the Rev. Ridley H. Horrell said, "The position of the Jews throughout Europe was different now from what it was fifteen or twenty years ago. A vast change had taken place in their character and condition." They now studied general literature, which was not then the case. Throughout all Germany, extending even into Russia, a movement has taken place among them, so that there is no country throughout Europe (except England) that has not one or more Jews in high office. In Germany, also, the newspapers are generally under their control. In their religious movements they are also undergoing a striking change. They have got quite a new lead in the minds of many of their leading men; it is this—that Judaism and Christianity should never have been placed in antagonism to each other. Now this is a very remarkable thing, though arising in an infidel religion—that religion is a philosophy for an age. But still there is an extraordinary mysterious desire for union."

The Evangelical Alliance.—At the proceedings of this body, in Glasgow, a sum was collected, amounting to £100 18s. 4d., to defray the expense of the deputation to Rome, for the release of Dr Achelis. A vote of thanks to the Glasgow committee for the arrangements they had made, and for the hospitality with which the members of the alliance had been entertained, as well as another acknowledging the services of Sir C. E. Bardsley and the office-bearers, was agreed to. The next meeting of the alliance will take place in Dublin.

Sir Culling Bardey was one of the chief men at the meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, at Glasgow, last week. He presided at all the "conference meetings," and he described the Alliance as "a great success."

An experiment has been tried with success in the neighbourhood of Sheffield, Eng. It consists of a model pauper farm, upon which a large number of able-bodied paupers are employed in bringing a large tract of hitherto waste land into cultivation. The plan originated with Mr. Watson, clerk to the Sheffield union, and at present works admirably.

INDEPENDENCE OF THE SANDWICH ISLANDS.

—The Boston *Advertiser* makes the important announcement that Kanemahula, King of the Sandwich Islands, has appointed James J. Jarvis, of Boston, a special commissioner to Washington, London, and Paris, with the request that he should negotiate treaties with the Governments of the United States, Great Britain, and France, by which in future a more complete political independence will be accorded to the young but most interesting Government. The former treaty, effected through the agency of Rev. Wm. Richards, seemed as much as was to be expected at the time—a much, perhaps, as was desirable for the Islands themselves. Since that period, great advances have been made in civilization, and in the stability and material forces of the Government. The soil, soon to be missionary labour and self-denial has grown up and borne fruits, and the people that a few years ago were sunk in barbarism, are now capable of taking upon themselves the responsibilities of independent government. Mr. Jarvis has long resided at the Islands, and entertains a just appreciation of the influence of the missionaries. He has the good of the Islands at heart, and we trust his diplomacy will be successful in securing for that people another advance in the march towards the dignity of a Christian nation.—*New York Evangelist.*
