

ROCKEFELLER'S HUGE FORTUNE

Is Subject of a Book by a
New York Man.

Henry H. Klein, first deputy commissioner of accounts of the city of New York, who in his book estimated the fortune of John D. Rockefeller, members of his family, and the funds established by him, at \$2,400,000,000, has given further figures of the Rockefeller holdings, tending to show that the estate of the elder Rockefeller is steadily decreasing as the result of distribution of his wealth among other members of his family, a practice which, Mr. Klein states, is not uncommon among wealthy men well along in years.

"This distribution of the Rockefeller estate has proceeded to such an extent that, Mr. Klein said, he believed, from knowledge derived from a study of the Rockefeller wealth, that when Rockefeller dies his estate will not exceed \$800,000,000.

Mr. Klein's statement was in reply to a letter written by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in which he said his father's estate had never reached \$1,000,000,000, and has been materially reduced by the large gifts from principal which he has made during recent years. Rockefeller's comment was the result of review of Klein's book, "Dynastic America and Those Who Own It," in which he made the statement as to the size of the Rockefeller holdings.

"Nowhere was it written or said that Mr. Rockefeller's estate reached a billion dollars or any other sum," said Klein today. "The statement made in the newspapers in reviewing my book was that I estimate the Rockefeller fortune at \$2,400,000,000. This, the newspapers explained, and my book states, includes the holdings of John D. Sr., and John D. Jr., his sisters, and the Foundations.

Mr. Rockefeller did not contradict this estimate, nor is he likely to. This estimate in my book is supported by detailed figures.

"There is no doubt that the estate of John D. Sr., will be less than a billion dollars, because most of his wealth has passed from his hands, according to

Sr., holds only 1,000 shares of preferred stock (par value \$100,000), and no common stock; while John D. Jr., holds 422,880 shares common and 88,070 preferred, valued together at about \$70,000,000. Other large blocks of stock are divided among other members of the family.

FRENCH STATE TELEPHONE SERVICE SHOWS DEFICIT

Paris, Aug. 18.—(Associated Press by Mail).—The deficit of the French telephone service, which is run by the state, will amount to over 220,000,000 francs for this year, according to Louis Deschamps, who ought to be well-informed as he was Under-Secretary of State for the department of posts, telegraphs and telephones in the previous cabinet.

M. Deschamps says that the service needs an expenditure of 1,500,000,000 francs for improvement and extension and recommends the state, if it cannot see its way to this outlay, to hand the service back to private companies and let them reorganize it.

ACCEPT GIFT OF HALLOWED SPOT AT GRAND PRE

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Grand Pre, N. S., Aug. 18.—Kneeling here this afternoon about the statue of "Evangeline," the heroine of Longfellow's famous poem on the ground once occupied by the church in which their ancestors worshipped, 300 members of the Acadia national congress blessed the spot and rising, sang with evident emotion their national hymn. "Ave the war and the occasion signalled the formal acceptance by the Acadia race of a gift of the ground from the Dominion Atlantic Railway. On behalf of the congress, Hon. Dr. V. Landry, of Bouchette, president, formally took possession of the spot and undertook the management of building there a memorial church. After an eloquent address by Rev. A. D. Macdonald, minister of the French-speaking people, a subscription toward the project was begun immediately on suggestion of Hon. P. J. Veniot, of Bathurst.

George Graham, manager of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, addressed the delegates, explaining what improvements that company was about to make in the site of the proposed memorial church, and Dr. Landry replied in English, saying that the railway company for its munificent gift and all English-speaking Nova Scotians should be grateful to the French-speaking people. They might be very sure, he said, of reciprocal sentiment on the part of the French-speaking people.

CHILD WELFARE EXHIBIT WILL BE ON LARGER SCALE

Preliminary Organization Effected at Meeting in Red Cross Depot—Many Societies Will Aid.

Organization for the child welfare exhibit, which the department of public health will have at the St. John exhibition, was commenced with much energy and enthusiasm at a meeting held in the Red Cross depot yesterday afternoon when the various interested societies were represented in the gathering headed by Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health, who was in the chair.

Dr. Roberts explained that following the war and the epidemic of influenza, there had come full recognition of the fact that public welfare was the most important endeavor in the interests of civilization both from an economic and from a humanitarian point of view. The month would give an insight into a sense of responsibility in the matter and in the province the Red Cross society was one of the great mediums which was enabling the department of health to work most effectively. He spoke of the necessity for education, publicity along the lines of health—without public opinion behind it, legislation was worth little. Practical demonstrations of health work were the best means of bringing public support and the welfare exhibit, he believed, was one of the best methods of education and of publicity obtainable. Last year some 70,000 persons had passed through the child welfare exhibit, heard of the different object lessons, read pamphlets on health matters and seen demonstrations of health work.

Last year's exhibit, while not the largest, had been one of the most valuable ever presented in the Dominion. He hoped this year's would be even more successful. DOG FOUND BODY OF MISSING MAN

Gruesome Discovery Made in Swamp Near Uxbridge.

Uxbridge, Ont., Aug. 18.—The mystery created by the disappearance on July 6 last of George Thomas Miller, aged twenty-one, from the farm of Robert Gregg, at Victoria Corners, was solved when Miller's body was located in a swamp bordering on the town. The corpse was badly decomposed and the clothing was covered with Paris green, leading, in the opinion of coroner W. C. Shier, to the conclusion that the deceased had committed suicide.

A prominent part in the recovery of the body was taken by H. G. Van Every of 77 Kingmont Park Road, Toronto, who was visiting in Uxbridge. He was motoring Sunday evening when a dog ran across the road, carrying in its mouth a human head. Mr. Van Every immediately communicated with the coroner, and early Monday a search party of sixty members was organized.

The late Mr. Miller was a native of England and was brought to this country through the agency of the Dr. Barling-Homes. He is believed to have a sister in Guelph.
