### NEW GARDEN SUBURB NEAR LINCOLN, ENG.

(A. Buckley in Conversation.)

The contention that it is the "duty" of large employers of labor to provide decent housing for their workers has been freely combatted. Another argument is coming to the fore, that is likely to be more convincing because it is based on practical considerations, namely, that it is greatly to their advantage. One manufacturer who has adopted this method of "prosperity sharing" has confessed that, whereas before housing accommodation was provided the labor turnover was 400 per cent, at present it is practically nil and labor unrest is a thing of the past.

It is being proved also that the new method of housing workers is susceptible of important economies and the creation of amenities and convenience for home life such as have been hitherto the privilege of the rich.

The engineering firm of Ruston & Hornsby, Lincoln, Eng., have acquired an estate of 970 acres, near Lincoln, in the vicinity of a lake, known as the Swanpool, and are there building an industrial garden suburb with provision for 8,000 houses. The estate is being laid out on "garden city" lines, with ample provision for shops, schools, institutes, recreation grounds, allotment gardens and other amenities. The housing will be managed on co-partnership principles and will not be confined to the employees of the firm.

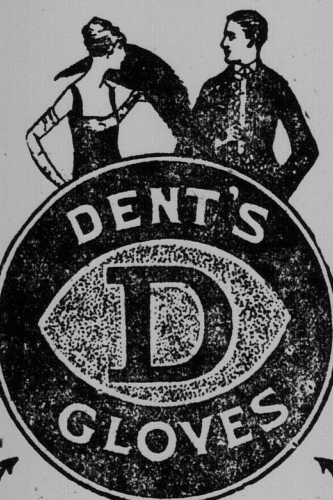

FORCE OF PUBLIC OPINION.

Recognition by the responsible element among the mine leaders of the gathering forces of public opinion was one of the impelling causes behind the settlement at Indianapolis yesterday. This was shown in the rejection of the proposal brought forward by the radical element that the miners' convention be reassembled to debate the president's offer, a process which would have involved more than a week's prolongation of the strike. Yet only Mr. Lewis and his supporters, but the men who urged a policy of delay, must have been aware of the folly of such a move in the face of the country's necessities and the country's growing resentment. But more than that, from the experience with which the miners have been awaiting the order to get back to work it is obvious that among the rank and file there was a very acute sense of the risk involved in utterly antagonizing public sentiment. It is no secret that the heads of the miners' union had grown fearful of the consequences which a defiance of the public welfare might bring upon the whole

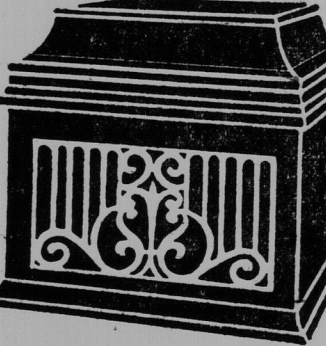
**\$1,750 FOR A BROKEN LEG.**

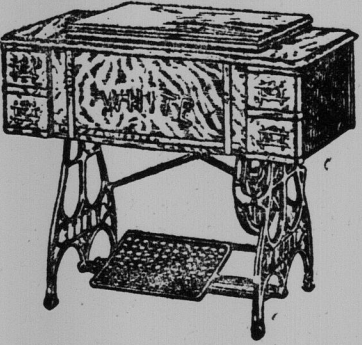
