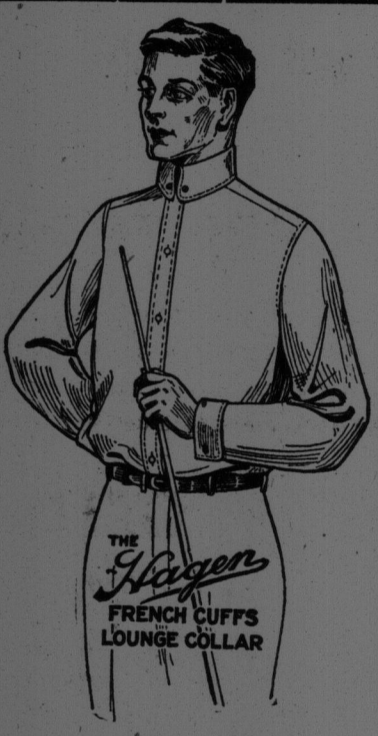

DEFENDER OF PORT ARTHUR REPORTED DYING IN POVERTY

General Stoessel

St. Petersburg, Russia, July 27.—Deprived of rank, pay and pension, the "defender of Port Arthur" General Anatoly Stoessel, is dying in poverty and obscurity in the little village of Hmelnik.

After his surrender of Port Arthur in the Russo-Japanese war to General Nogi in 1905, Stoessel was court-martialed on the charge of cowardice and sentenced to imprisonment, and after two years he was released. He was without means and made a living selling tea. He is now living on the bounty of his former adjutant, Colonel Kaidi.

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Clark Skinner occurred at her late residence, 222 King street east, yesterday, after an illness extending over a period of some six months. The deceased, who was a very well known lady, was the widow of R. Chapman Skinner, who was judge of probate for the city and county of St. John.

For a period of nine years the late Mrs. Skinner was a very much valued member of the board of school trustees, and on her retirement last March, a resolution expressing the general regret of the Board of School Trustees, of Boston, at her retirement and appreciation of her services, was unanimously passed. Besides this she was active in several other organizations including the Women's Suffrage Association and the Natural History Society. She was in the 67th year of her age.

She is survived by two daughters, two sisters and three brothers. The daughters are Mrs. E. W. Hamilton, of Vancouver (B. C.), and Mrs. Walter S. Burritt, of Hamilton (Ont.). The sisters are Mrs. George Oulton, of this city; and Mrs. Charlotte Lawrence, of Boston (Mass.), and the brothers are Frederick Clarke, of Boston; Harry Clarke, of Philadelphia; and Sam Clarke, of Buffalo (Mont.).

The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon from her late residence, 222 King street east, at 2:30 o'clock.

Senator McMillan died at his home, Alexandria, Ontario, last night. He was eighty years of age. In politics he was a Conservative.

Frank W. Merrithew, aged 47 years, died on Saturday at Douglas, York county. He is survived by his wife, two sons and three sisters.
