New York, Dec. 2.—Americans in London strong up 1/4 to 1/2, the latter Union Pacific.

Penna. Railroad all lines show for October gross increase, \$4,297,076, net increase, \$1,177,631. They save about 25 per cent. of the gross in net, which is rather above the average of roads that have so far reported for October.

Eric gross increase, \$774,231, net increase, \$383,211. That is very poor.

Atlantic Coast Line gross increase, \$348,892, net increase only \$8,280.

Plans for Reception to New Bishop Are Perfected

Plans for the reception of Bishop Elect LeBlanc on his arrival in the city tomorrow night have been perfected.

The committee composed of W. J. Mahoney, J. Barry, G. German and Dr. C. Kelly will leave on the noon train for Montreal to meet His Lordship.

On the arrival of the train in the city at 8:30 p. m. His Lordship will be met by the Catholic societies and reported to the Cathedral, where the preparation of the congregation will be made.

The procession will be headed by the City Crier Band. The order of the procession will be—Father Matthew, Bishop Elect, Knights of Columbus, Ancient Order of Hibernians, and the baroness with His Lordship and clergymen.

A delegation from the uniform rank of the A. O. H. will act as a bodyguard. Major Thomas Kilkham will act as marshal.

The route will be from the depot by Mill, Dock, King, Charlotte, Union, and Waterloo streets to the Cathedral. The A. O. H. cadets will be lined up at the Cathedral and will act as a guard of honor.

His Lordship will review the parade from the steps of the palace before proceeding to the Cathedral.

FIRST REPORT UNDER MOVING PICTURE LAW.

MR. SPENCER EXPLAINS Says Many Children Were Sent Away From Unique — Asks Some Questions Relative to New Regulations

Noting that the Unique Theatre had been reported for failing to adhere to the new regulations last Saturday afternoon by admitting children under the age of ten unaccompanied by adults, Mr. Spencer this morning gave out the following:

"I have no knowledge of the particular incident for which Mr. Killen has apparently reported the Unique, but do know that, in an effort to carry out this new law, the ticket seller reported to me that upwards of one hundred children were reported to be permitted to attend the matinee act on Saturday afternoon, who were supposed to be under the age of ten and unaccompanied by adults. Here is a poor specimen of the act as it was reported to me: 'Children under the age of ten years unaccompanied by adults, shall not be permitted to attend any exhibition by Cinematograph Moving Picture Machine, or other similar apparatus at which an admission fee is charged.'"

"You will note that according to the reading of the act that a child of nine accompanied by her sister of sixteen or more could not be admitted to the matinee, and their refusal was a common occurrence at the motion picture houses last Saturday. The laws says the party accompanying the parent must be an adult, and the parent must be present when the phone calls to the Unique office Saturday afternoon from aggravated mothers to learn why their children had been refused admission, and when told that the new government regulations were responsible for the circumstances, they seemed anything but satisfied."

"Again at night the age limit is fifteen. One evening last week I queried two big lusty boys who looked like young men regarding their ages and learned that in each instance it was fourteen, and further questioning elicited the information that they had both been long since emancipated. Are these boys to be deprived of the pleasure and profit derived from motion pictures without any reason, and without any question as to the fact that those responsible for this new law admit that its adoption was not the result of either common sense or pressure, a Provincial Commission has been established which means that the picture will be censored three times over before it is shown in this province."

First, by the Ontario government, and which is paid and competent National Board in New York, which suffices for the seventy millions in all the various states and provinces across the border, again in Toronto by the board of censors appointed by the Ontario government, and which are expected to answer for all Canada, then our own N. B. censorship steps in and passes its mark of approval or disapproval as the case may be.

"Notwithstanding all these safe guards, and the fact that local exhibitors are taxed to pay for the censorship, the government is not satisfied with the present regulations to perfect the entertainment that the children must not attend unless accompanied by a parent or guardian."

"The picture shows a child in an extreme, and an interference with their business which is not warranted by the regulations. The picture shows a child, attended by the best class of children and adults, (not exclusively of course), and has become a sensation in every town, and a nature which deserves any thing but adverse legislation."

"At great expense I gave the children an opportunity last week of seeing the story of Pilgrim's Progress, told on the picture curtain, one of these children not only never read the story, but had no opportunity of hearing it through their parents, who are responsible for the ignorance of it. But the law said that fourteen year old children may not see Pilgrim's Progress. There are items in the programme of every picture house weekly which compare in intelligence with Pilgrim's Progress and to which the same argument applies, and we have yet to hear of any picture which has an undesirable effect and if such pictures do exist, it will be the duty of the censors to point them out. And yet the government will even after the censors begin their work, hold every fourteen year old boy who holds a picture house license in his hands, and will not only never read the story, but had no opportunity of hearing it through their parents, who are responsible for the ignorance of it. 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
