HEARING IN CASE OF NEPISQUIT LUMBER COMPANY

Petition Presented For Distribution of Assets—Judgment in Case of Rochester vs. Agar

In the matter of the Nepisquit Lumber Company, Limited, and its winding up, hearing was continued before Mr. Justice McLeod in chambers this morning at 10 o'clock. H. A. Powell, K. C., appearing for W. H. Harrison, presented a petition asking that the greater part of the assets paid to the holder of certain debentures. The assets were the proceeds of property, most of which was acquired after the mortgage in question had been given. Mr. Powell argued that the mortgage was to be secured, not only by the properties held by the company, at the time the said mortgage was given, but also by all properties acquired thereafter.

W. A. Ewing, K. C., H. F. Puddington and Fred E. Taylor, who appeared for other creditors, argued against this contention, claiming that the debenture holders were only entitled to the proceeds of the properties acquired previous to the giving of the mortgage.

The evidence of George Gilbert and Elbridge P. Mackay, the liquidators of the company, was heard with respect to the assets of the company. Hearing was adjourned until this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock when the taking of evidence of the liquidators will be resumed. M. G. Teed, K. C., appeared for the liquidators.

Circuit Court.

At the adjourned sitting of the March circuit, Mr. Justice Landry this morning rendered judgment in the case of Edmund Rochester of New York vs. Miles E. Agar. A verdict was given for the plaintiff for \$1,001.44, but the amount was not definitely decided further argument was adjourned until next Friday when the matter of costs will also be argued. This was an action to recover about \$2,000 for rope sold to the defendant. A large portion of the claim was admitted and a set-off was claimed with respect to the balance. There was an alleged shortage in the quantity of rope shipped, and the defendant also claimed the benefit of a debt due Henderson Black, of St. John's, Quebec, by the plaintiff, the case in action being assigned by the former to John Connor, and by him to the defendant.

F. R. Taylor appeared for the plaintiff and Recorder Baxter, K. C., for the defendant.

MAGISTRATE'S OPINION ON RULES OF ROAD

Satisfied There is Law Enough, But Will Write to Commissioners—Inmates Found Guilty—Burglars Allowed to Go

There were quite a number of spectators in the police court this morning to hear the judgment which was to have been delivered by the court in connection with the charges made against W. C. Cross and del. Carritte for infringements of the new rules of road. Mr. Cross was charged with going around the corner of Union and Dock streets at a furious rate of speed, and Mr. Carritte was charged with driving his car on the wrong side of Mill street, viz: the right side. A. A. Wilson, K. C., appeared for Mr. Cross, but J. A. Belyea, who appeared yesterday for Mr. Carritte did not appear. His Honor said, therefore, that he would defer judgment until Monday morning at 10 o'clock when all interested would be present.

In commenting on the charges in Mr. Carritte's case His Honor referred to the argument put forth by Mr. Belyea yesterday that there was no law which side teams should be driven on. He stated that he had looked over the matter at some length and felt satisfied that there was enough law to prohibit people from driving on the wrong side of the streets. He cited several cases, including O'Brien vs. Corbett, and Wright vs. Dolan in which the offence charged was practically the same as in this case. "But," said His Honor, "even if there was no law, or even if it was a little common sense, or the late Justice Tuck would say a little horse sense, it is a nice time we would have if drivers of wagons and automobiles did not follow the custom of going and coming on different sides of the roads. Why, teams would be running into each other and the same to the commissioners when next they meet in regard to this matter. However, I will defer further into the matter and give judgment on Monday morning."

His Honor delivered judgment in the case of Mrs. Moore, charged with keeping a house of ill repute in Germain street, and of Clarence Clark and Mary Stogger, charged with being inmates. He adjudged all three guilty. Clark was fined \$10 or nine months in jail, but was allowed to go on suspended sentence. The two women were remanded for sentence. His Honor told them, however, that they would be sent out of the city instead of to jail.

Hearing in the case of George Fowler and Charles Long charged with breaking and entering a C. E. Freight car and stealing therefrom a quantity of rope, was continued this morning. J. King Kelly, K. C., appeared for Fowler, and E. S. Ritchie for Long. Police Constable Lucas told Sergeant Stogger, who told him that the man who was with him was Long. Consequently they went to Long's house in Moore street and placed him under arrest. Fowler had told him that Long got in the car and was throwing the rope out to him. Witness stated that the rope was the same as would come off the bags of rope. Sgt. Scott told of seeing Long and Fowler together on the night of the robbery. The prisoners were remanded. The case will come up for hearing tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Harry Rogers, arrested last week on a warrant charging him with trespassing on the C. E. R. tracks near Bentley street, and trying to communicate by lying down in front of a moving train, was brought in and allowed to go on condition that he go to Westfield to work. William Johnston, foreman of the St. John Ice Company, pleaded guilty to the charge of obstructing the sidewalk on Germain street with fifteen cakes of ice, and was fined \$20.

MODERN BRICK BUILDING ON BRUSSELS STREET FOR UNGAR'S LAUNDRY

Enterprising Company Will Have One of Most Modern Plants in Eastern Canada

The property formerly owned by Richard Walsh in Brussels street, and recently sold by Jardine & Rive, will be the site of a modern laundry plant. Ungar's Laundry are to erect a fine four story brick and concrete building which is expected to be one of the finest in eastern Canada. Preparations are already being made for excavating and R. Neil Brodie, who is the architect in charge, will call for tenders shortly for this work. It had been hoped that the building would be ready for occupancy by the late fall, but on account of the nature of the excavation, solid rock, it will hardly be sooner than January before the structure is completed. The location is considered an excellent one for a laundry and it will no doubt be but the beginning of other up-to-date buildings which will before many years replace some of the older wooden buildings on the street.

The present premises of Ungar's laundry, which they have occupied for years, is the property of J. W. Myers. Though there have been a number of extensions the business of the laundry, which has been augmented by the amount of work for the winter port steamer, has increased to such an extent that it has become necessary to get into much larger quarters.
