INFANTILE PARALYSIS IS CAUSING DEATH OF MANY

There Have Been 220 Cases in Buffalo and 226 in Los Angeles

Buffalo, Sept. 13--Latest reports on the infantile paralysis situation show that there have been a total of 220 cases since the epidemic started a few months ago. Twenty-six deaths have resulted, and 60 per cent of the survivors are permanently crippled.

In the August number of the Public Health Report, printed by the United States government, it is shown that other cities have been troubled more or less by this disease, but Buffalo and Los Angeles, Cal., lead all in number of cases and fatal results. From June 8 to August 17, 226 cases of the disease were reported in Los Angeles, and forty-three deaths resulted. In Los Angeles day and night guards have been established to enforce the quarantine.
