Several of this morning's newspapers reflected this view and reports from political correspondents at Gairloch generally agreed that the ministers showed a more rigid attitude toward Southern Ireland.

It is declared there is a tendency on the part of the cabinet members who talked with the premier to insist that Eomonn De Valera formally withdraw his claim that Sinn Fein delegates would get the conference as representatives.
