To British subjects it is interesting to know that the tea product of India and Ceylon has increased with marvelous rapidity, and in the British market at least has pactically displaced the China crop. It is only a question of time till the same result is reached in Canada and the United States. The flavor and aroma of the steaming tea, served in Indian manufactured crockery, decorated by natives, handed round by the native servants in native garb, are something to be remembered, and a visit to the India Pavilion must remain one of the most interesting memories of the Fair.

In the official list of awards published this morning I find that the Ontario collection of Tropical plants in the Horticultural Building has been well placed, as it deserved. The large size and general excellence of this display has been stalled in the early May days.

I got a hint the other day from "Uncle John" Thorpe, director of floriculture, which is well worth knowing by everybody who has a garden. Mr. Thorpe stands at the head of his profession in America, and the floral display on the wooded sland and about the buildings has been one of the chief delights to those who have an eye for the beautiful in this direction. Among the foliage plants are many tender species such as Cannas, etc., and I was a little curious to know how it was proposed to protect them against the early frosts that are so destructive and exasperating to florists. Mr. Thorpe informed me that he watched the temperature very closely and when there was any fear of frost he kept the water running through a fine spray nozzle all night, and thus prevented damage.
