"OMAHA, Nebr .- For several hours the lives of more than 100 prisoners in the county jail here yesterday were endangered by flames, when the building was set afire by rioters in their attempt to secure William Brown, a negro, jailed on a charge of attacking a white girl in the city suburbs last It was finally necessary to send them all to the roof. Sheriff Clark stood off the angry mob until the flames caused the prisoners themselves to take action. They at first decided among themselves to throw the negro from the roof to the pavement below, and leave him to the destruction of the mob. During an attempt to dissuade the mob, Mayor Smith was seized and dragged through the streets, the men howling to lynch him and hurling other investives at the city's chief executive. He was rescued and dispatched to a hospital. It was at this movement that the mob gained entrance to the building, pushed past Sheriff Clark and his deputies and forced their way into the cell corridor.
