HALIFAX, Nov. 20.—At a board of trade meeting today it was reported that the demands made by Halifax flour shippers for better facilities at the Intercolonial terminus had been agreed to. The local export trade in flour and feed here was stated to be 400,000 barrels annually. Complaint was made regarding the delay in establishing the Southwest Shore steamship service between Halifax and St. John. The board was instructed to write to the Thomsons, and a delegation consisting of J. E. DeWolfe, G. S. Campbell and E. G. Smith was appointed to wait on the Nova Scotia government.

SPORTING NEWS.

Harvard and Yale.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 20.—The feature of the annual football contest between Harvard and Yale tomorrow on Soldiers' Field will be the assembling of 25,000 people in the new \$200,000 stadium, constituting one of the largest crowds that has ever witnessed a similar event in this country. Cambridge and Boston are therefore fairly jammed with college students, both graduates and undergraduates of the universities, all discussing eagerly the prospects of the game tomorrow.

It seems to be generally conceded that herring sukes, fumbles, such as prevailed at New Haven last week, Yale will win, although there has arisen at Harvard during the past day or two a feeling of quiet confidence in its team.

This feeling, however, was not sufficiently strong to induce many Harvard men to snap up wagers of three and four to one, which the sporting vanguard of the Yale cohorts offered, nor was there very much betting of the prospects of Harvard even scoring against the blues.

The Harvard team had fifteen minutes of secret practice this afternoon in the stadium and all the coaches appeared with cheerful faces.

Head Coach Cranston stated tonight that the team had shown great improvement since the Dartmouth game, especially in the handling of kicks, principally by Captain Marshall.

From Auburndale comes the report that the Yale team has had a good rest nearly all day, indulging in only an hour's signal practice this afternoon.

There were eight coaches with the team, and in addition to the players who came yesterday from New Haven, several more substitutes arrived today.

MEDFORD, Mass., Nov. 20.—The University of Maine eleven, the football champions of the State of Maine, were defeated by the Tufts College team today by the score of 11 to 6 in a game that abounded in spectacular runs and general excellent play. Tufts was in better physical condition than the victors and proved her superiority in every department of the game. Maine's defeat today is the second the team has experienced this season.

FOOTBALL TODAY.
The Wanderers' football team arrived in this city this morning. They play the All St. John team on the Shamrock grounds at 2.30 p. m.

It has been several years since Halifax has sent a football team to the Winter Port, and great interest is being taken in today's game. St. John is putting up a very strong opposition in the field against the Wanderers, in fact the heaviest team that has been got together in the city since the days of the old league games. Captain Marshall, A.D.C., who played centre in the All Canadian team which was sent to the old country last year, will fill this position in the All St. John team today, and he, with Johnny Malcolm, Powers, D'Oiloqui, and Day, will make the average weight of the first line in the scrimmage well on to 180 pounds. The half back made well on to 180 pounds.

It is to be hoped that there will be a large crowd of spectators to encourage the home team, and it is certainly that those who do attend will see the finest game of football played in St. John for some time.

HAMPTON ITEMS.

Before Judge Wendenburn, in Chambers at Hampton, yesterday, the cause Charles A. Peck against Wm. H. Turner, on review from the parish of Hopeville civil court, was argued, C. A. Peck in his own behalf, and M. G. Teed for the defendant. The plaintiff's verdict was set aside and an order for a new trial made by the judge.

The plaintiff, a barrister, sought to recover \$50 for legal services rendered the defendant in a summary conviction matter before the police court at Riverside, Albert Co., in 1898, when the defendant was convicted of negligence in reference to setting a fire in his field to burn brush, which spread and destroyed a small amount of property of a neighbor. The fine imposed was \$10, with 75 cents. The bill charged by his attorney for defending him was some \$77, and after certain credits were allowed, suit was brought for the balance, \$60. A verdict of \$33 was found for plaintiff. Not satisfied with that, Mr. Peck reviewed the case and it was ordered back for a new trial. A jury was applied for, but the plaintiff refused to allow a jury to be sworn and the magistrate tried out the case, and rendered a verdict for the plaintiff, who was still dissatisfied and again reviewed it before the same judge, claiming that the verdict should be increased to \$60. This was resisted by Mr. Teed, who claimed that the court below was not legally constituted without a jury and contended that the judgment had no jurisdiction to adjudicate. His honor concurred in this view and ordered a new trial. The costs in the original trial and of the first review to abide the event, and the costs of the last trial and the last review, each of the parties to pay their own.

HARVESTERS WANTED.
Good Wages for Both Men and Women.

General Manager MacNichol, of the C. P. R., reports that able bodied men can find employment in the Northwest. G., of the Royal Canadian Regiment, and not to Col. Drury, as at first reported. It is understood that an important position at headquarters, in which his technical qualifications will be of special value to the service generally, is to be offered to Col. Drury.
