

The action that is hard to answer, in a convincing way. Can they be made any better? Is another serious question.

When is a school good? When is it bad?

Leonard P. Ayres, expert of the Russell Sage foundation, is at last finding a measure for public schools. He has studied the schools of 63 American ctries, and a report will shortly be made of educators all over the country.

One of Ayres' tests is: How strongly do the schools draw the children and how long do they hold them?

The average American city carries all its children to the sixth grade, and one-tenth through the eighth grade, and one-tenth through the leighth grade.
