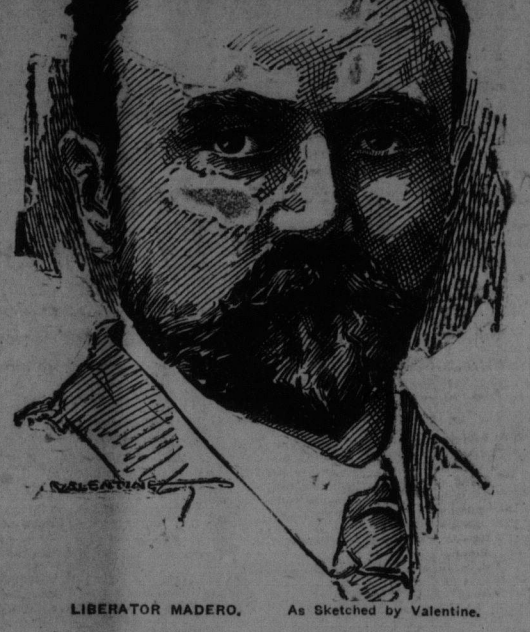

PRETENDING DREAMER IS
LIBERATOR MADERO, WHO RISKED ALL
TO FREE HIS COUNTRY
BY WILLIAM G. SHEPHERD.
 Juarez, Mexico, June 2.-Most of the
 big things in the insurrection war have
 happened in the lobby of the marble
 Sheldon Hotel at El Paso.
 Most of the heroes live there. All
 of them plot there, standing about in
 small groups, or sitting in the lobby
 chairs, looking much like talkative
 drummers.
 Evening is the proper time for see-
 ing the "war" in the hotel lobby.
 In a rocking chair sits Col. Steever
 of the U. S. fourth cavalry. If there
 is intervention at this point he is the
 man who will start it. Yet he is gos-
 siping with Jose Carbajal, personal
 representative of Diaz.
 A bevy of laughing women, dressed
 in black, pass through the corridor.
 Among them is Mrs. Madero, wife of
 the liberator, and two of his younger
 sisters. They are on their way to the
 cafe for a merry dinner. An elderly
 man, with dark whiskers, carrying an
 umbrella and wearing an alpaca coat—
 an old-fashioned business man—gets a
 batch of telegrams from the hotel clerk
 and takes the elevator for his room.
 He is Francisco Madero, father of the
 insurrection leader.
 Here stands Michael Brennan, Ala.,
 who took his vacation at this time to
 see the insurrection. He is now in St.
 James' hospital with a fractured
 skull under police guard, while Victor
 Ross, commercial traveller, is in the
 Winnipeg general hospital with a broken

CHINA NOW
AWAKENING
Advices from Pekin Say China
will Look Out for a New
Deal on Existing Russian
Treaty.
 St. Petersburg, June 4.-Advices
 from Pekin say that China contem-
 plates a revision of the Russo-Chinese
 treaty of 1851, which expires in August
 unless it is renewed.
 The ultimatum issued recently by
 Russia with regard to the interpreta-
 tion of the treaty was based on the
 supposition that China would leave
 the treaty intact, inasmuch as revision
 would open up great difficulties and in-
 volve the long standing Russian priv-
 ileges such as the exclusive right to
 navigation on the Sungarei and ex-
 clusive trade in Mongolia. A revision
 of the treaty would involve new rights
 for Russia, but it is believed that the
 Chinese are more active commercially and diplomatically
 than this country.
 Russia considered that China had
 less to lose by renewing the Russian
 privileges intact than by curtailing
 them, but the Chinese plans cannot be
 carried out without provoking anew
 the question of the re-occupation of
 Kulla, as a Russo-Chinese treaty can-
 not be considered without reference
 to the events of 1851.
