CHANGE IN GAS RATES IN ST. **CROIX TOWNS**

Hearing Will Be Held at Calais on March 7 to Consider Proposed Changes.

Augusta, Me., Feb. 20.—The St. Croix Gas Light Co. has filed a new schedule of rates, effective March 20, with the Public Utilities Commission for lighting fuel, heat and power as follows: Two dollars and forty cents per 1,000 cubic feet for the first 2,000 cubic feet; \$2.30 per 1,000 cubic feet for the next 2,000 cubic feet; \$2.20 per 1,000 cubic feet for the next 6,000 cubic feet; and \$2.10 per 1,000 cubic feet for an excess over 10,000 cubic feet.
