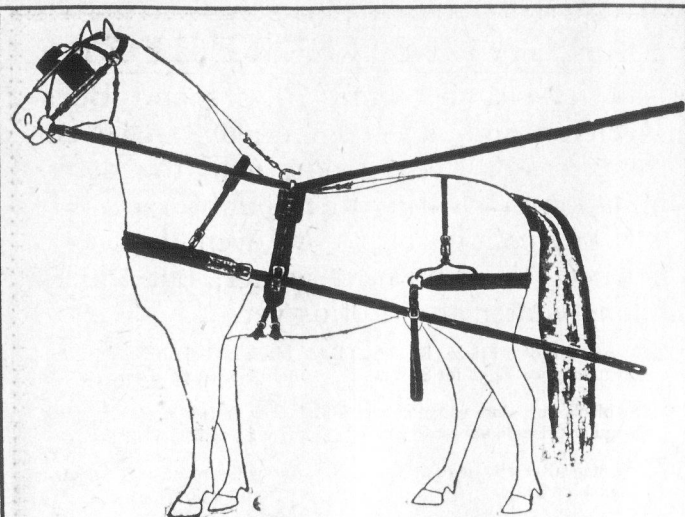

THE LORDS AT WORK.

Amusing Customs in the Upper House of the English Parliament.

Commoners and educationists who watch the debates in the Upper House are amused by the easy-going methods of the peers and the smaller importance they set on their dignity than is the fashion in the other House.

The Lord Chancellor, as president, takes part in debate as freely as anyone else. He simply steps aside from the woolsack and becomes a debater, returns to his seat, and resumes his functions as president. In committee he sits with the Government, wearing wig and gown, and leads in the discussion, along with the Duke of Devonshire.

In the Commons the Speaker calls on the orator if two or more members rise. The Lords rule themselves. One gives way to another; or, if that code of courtesy fail, the House settles the precedence, and makes it up. The other night the Bishop of Hereford rose to speak, his neighbor and right reverend brother pulled him back on to the bench; the Bishop of Hereford thereupon restrained the reverend prelate in turn with a gentle hand, and allowed Lord Tweedmouth to catch the ear of the House.

The woolsack is no more sacred than the cross benches. Peers sit upon it and chat to the Lord Chancellor or to each other, and occasionally the small figure of Lord Halsbury is half hidden by Conservative and Liberal members, who use his official seat as a pleasant lounge halfway between their benches and the door. In committee members sit beside the chairman at the table. Lord Rosebery prefers the seat on the chairman's left when he is about to speak. In the House of Commons no member would dream of encroaching in such a manner on the Speaker or the Chairman of committees. The Lords also permit members to pass feet up and down the floor, which would be a breach of privilege in the Commons.

The side of the House on which a peer sits is no sure indication of his views. Unionists sit opposite the Government along with the Liberals. Lord Halifax, the leader of the High Churchmen, whose views on the Education Bill are the epitome of Lord Spencer's, sits behind the Liberal leader. So does Lord Campbell, and from that place he takes the liberty of lecturing and criticising the "Red Earl."

A singular survival is the fashion of the tellers who carry little wands as they count the members voting. They stand inside the House, and touch each peer or bishop on the shoulder with the cane as he enters from the lobby, and so count the strength of their side.

From the open galleries peeresses look down on the House, but it is doubtful if they hear much. The Lords are not very clear speakers, and many of them are not visible in the public and press galleries.—London Mail.

Population of Ireland.
According to the report of the Registrar-General for Ireland the marriages registered in that country in 1921 numbered 22,564, the births 100,976, and the deaths 79,119. The marriage rate (5.08 per 1,000 of the estimated population) shows an increase of 0.31 as compared with that for the preceding year, and is 0.22 above the average rate for the ten years 1891-1900; the birth rate (17.8 per 1,000) is 1.8 below the rate for the preceding year, and is 0.22 below the average rate for the ten years 1891-1900; while the death rate (17.8 per 1,000) is 1.8 below the rate for the preceding year, and is 0.22 below the average rate for the ten years 1891-1900. The recorded natural increase of population, or excess of births over deaths, was 21,857. The loss by emigration amounted to 39,613. There would thus appear to have been a decrease of 17,756 in the population during the year, but against this decrease there is a set-off in immigration of which no official record has been obtained. The estimated population in the middle of the year was 4,445,630.

Decline in the British Birth Rate.

According to figures recently published in London, France is not the only country in which the birth rate is below the normal. The statistics also show a marked decline in the English birth rate. London shows a decrease of 0.81 from 27.4 to 26.6 per 100 of married women under the age of 45 years. The decline is most noticeable in the fashionable quarters of the capital, while the slum areas, such as Stepney, Shadwell and Bethnal Green, are almost stationary. Outside of London the decline amounts to 25.8 against 3.03 in 1890.—Medical Record.

Rewards Prince of Teck.

As a sort of reward, after preventing his relative from becoming a member of a London stock-broking firm, King Edward has allowed Prince Francis of Teck \$10,000 a year until the Prince can obtain some remunerative position more in keeping with his standing as a member of the Royal Family.

Moved by Boyer and Lewis, that Mr. Caron, treasurer, be refunded \$4.84 paid by him for stationery for his office.—Carried.

Moved by Boyer and Lewis, that the reeve be refunded 93 cents paid by him for provisions for William Duckett, a destitute person.—Carried.

Moved by Crawford and Lewis, that \$35.98 collected from ratepayers be credited to the Hyatt and Fryer Outfall drain—by-law 229.—Carried.

Moved by Crawford and Lewis, that the following persons be paid \$3.00 each for polling stations at the last Municipal election and charged to election account: Asher Head, div. No. 1, Donne-Gagnier div. No. 3, Gregory G. Caron div. No. 4, Zephir Cheff div. No. 5, C. W. Raymond div. No. 6, Joseph Rankin div. No. 7, John Coveny div. No. 8.—Carried.

Moved by King and Crawford, that Joseph G. Thomas be appointed pothole keeper.—Carried.

Moved by Lewis and Boyer, that the Reeve and Clerk get figures from the Chatham offices for the balance of printing, and that the council adjourn to meet at the Town Hall on Monday, Feb. 9th.—Carried.
