C H A P. I.

An Act for the better regulation of the MILITIA in this Province.

C H A P. II.

An Act to provide for the nomination and appointment of PARISH and TOWN OFFICERS

WHEREAS, it is requisite for the maintenance of good order and the regular execution of the Laws, that proper officers should be appointed to superintend the observance thereof; Be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'" and by the authority of the same, That it shall and may
