Karen Jamieson Dance Company Brings GAWA GYANI to Playhouse In the final UNB/STU Creative Arts Playhouse Series performance of the season, the Vancouverbased Karen Jamieson Dance Company brings its controversial and critically-acclaimed Gawa Gyani to the Playhouse this Tuesday, March 24, at 8 p.m.

Gawa Gyani is the Gitskan name for an arena of exchange between two opposing forces, each with its own strengths and "goods." The stage of the Playhouse, then is the Gawa Gyani -- an "empty space" which can be seen as a metaphor for a clear and open mind. Gawa Gyani is also a collaborative partnership between the Karen Jamieson Dance Company and native Gitskan performers. The resolution here, which maintains the integrity of both sides and the dialogue between them, is one aspect of the piece's uniqueness. And the medium of this dialogue is dance-the sririt of motion.
