I have no grudge against the Electors: Egerton is doubtless technically & far better equipped. Whether he will make as much of the position for Oxford & the Empire remains to be seen.

I am really very much obliged to you for sending me a copy of your Memoir of Hawker. I have at once read it thro' with keen interest.

It was, indeed, a wise thought to commemorate such a deed of heroism - such deeds and their memories are among the things which make a country worth living in. And it is a peculiarly happy thing that the deed was in his case the consummation of a high-minded life. It is not always so; in split - face true - of the title of your book. Only too often the deed of self sacrifice ends a life which has apparently been poor & mean. We can but believe that in such cases it reveals an ennobled nobleness - (at any rate of a sort of) a nature which had before
