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I am also giving consideration to the further suggestion you have made respecting the desirability of bringing the Canadian law into line with British legislation on the subject of the right of labour unions to strike.

I note what you say as to your intention of going to the Coast for a continued stay, and your thought of resigning the Presidency of the Liberal Association for Manitoba as a consequence. Unless your stay is likely to be prolonged, I hope you will not feel it necessary to reach any hurried decision in this matter.

As to what may be advisable in the circumstances you and your friends alone are in a position to decide. My hope, however, is that until I have had an opportunity of visiting the west, which I am looking forward to doing as soon as the present session of Parliament is at an end, such organizations as we have in the different provinces may be made subject to such changes only as will serve to strengthen them and to lend added confidence and prestige.
