- (e) The same condition shall apply to the assets of all individuals so demanded by the International Court, as shown in Book I, Section A, Neutral Countries, Page 18.

NOTE

The penalties laid down in the foregoing with regard to individual offenders are necessarily severe. It must be remembered that one individual offender may be endangering the peace and security of many millions throughout the world.

No penalty can be too severe.

Sentimentalism and past service or position must no be countenanced in the slightest degree. All will be aware of these penalties and no excuse could compensate for the injury they might cause.

- (f) In the event of a company transgressing international laws, then the International Court, on the recommendation of its sub-council, shall have the power to demand that individuals, officials, etc., in any capacity, shall be handed over to the International Court for trial.
- (g) In the event of conviction of any international offence, then the nation whose nationals, whether individuals, companies or other organizations, etc., have been so convicted, shall be allowed to confiscate such assets as the convicted party or parties may own or control, either directly or indirectly, in such nation.
